### RECONSTRUCTION HORRORS IN THE SOUTH.

The shocking outrages upon life and property which have been perpetrated of late in Arkansas and other portions of the South afford another specimen of the workings of reconstruction, surpassing even those of Tennessee. The arming of a militia composed in great part of ignorant and illiterate men has led to scenes of bloodshed and of worse than bloodshed, which is appalling to contemplate. The Arkansas militia is charged with plundering the people, arresting citizens without warrant, murdering prisoners, ravishing women, while in the mean time the cotton fields, white with cotton, are left to destruction. The radical Governor of the State has actually authorized this militia to force upon the communities in which they may happen to be, and this in time of peace.

The Ogechee troubles in Georgia, which have only been quieted by the military finally taking charge, are a later exhibition of that which malignant interlopers are trying to fashion into an "irrepressible conflict" between the two races. Because of some alleged disagreement about wages or their proportion of the crops, the colored population of that district is said to have been worked up to a state of complete insurrection, compelling the white inhabitants to flee to the cities for protection, and attempting to take forcible possession of the lands and property of the whites, which they had been promised by political adventurers, but found they could only obtain by violence.

In both the Arkansas and Georgia troubles, there have been representations made by military officials, whose partisanship is patent to every eye, to explain away and belittle these occurrences, which, if it can be done, would have the effect of showing that reconstruction is not working altogether in the direction of political and social chaos. It is admitted, however, in the letter of Gen. Foster, who presides over the investigation of the Arkansas troubles, also "who militates against all the disloyal and hostile influences from them to support the laws." He also states that the Governor "could seldom secure good men for officers, and in the various counties he had to depend entirely upon negroes as soldiers."

Here, then, is conceded to be an organization which "good men" could not be had to command, and which in the eastern counties was composed entirely of negroes and this organization pursued a policy of terror and intimidation, being themselves, for aught that appears to the contrary, judge, jury and executioner. It is also admitted in the report that business men of all parties were injured where martial law was proclaimed, travel interfered with, supplies taken from the people "under orders," and that the negro militia had ravaged the white woman, for which he says he was executed, though how many more offences of the same kind were perpetrated for which no one was punished does not appear. Gen. Porter seems to rely a good deal upon the statements of the Governor of Arkansas, the party who is principally criticized in these proceedings, and whose reports "ask" for warranted arrests of the Governor of Arkansas to martial law show the manner of such acts. It is by no means probable that there should have been such a number of refugees from Arkansas to Memphis on account of the conduct of the militia, if their deportment had been as decorous and orderly as Gen. Porter seems to suppose.

In all these difficulties the military have to be called in. That is the uniform recourse. Reconstruction, so called, everywhere has to be supplemented by the sword. The army is the common umpire to whose arbitration both sides in the South must needs submit. Thus only is it that order is or will be preserved, and thereby we understand how it is possible to realize the sentiment, "Let us have peace." Whether the toll of life is paid by any instrument of violence is likely to be much less than the cost of war, as a question worthy to be considered by an economical administration.

How long would it be able to preserve the extraordinary compassion and equanimity, the indifferent air of "Am I my brother's keeper?" with which it regards the doings now occurring in Southern States? This indifference indicates the program and shows the animus of some of the radical leaders. Let them not get the credit too abruptly, let the whole moral sense of Christians should receive a shock that will make itself felt, even at this distance from the central seats of the world's civilization, in the scorn and execration of all mankind.
