OFFENSIVE WARNINGS TO GEN. GRANT.

It occurs to us that the true way for Senators to act concerning the tenure of office would be to vote one way or another upon the proposition of the House to repeal it. PETITION OF MRS. LINCOLN.—The following is a copy of the petition of Mrs. Lincoln, asking for a pension, which was presented in the United States Senate on Monday:

To the Honorable Vice President of the United States.—Sir:—I herewith most respectfully present to the Honorable Senate of the United States an application for a pension. I am a widow of a President of the United States, whose life was sacrificed in his country's service. That sad calamity has very greatly impaired my health, and by the advices of my physicians I have come to try the mineral waters, and during the winter to go to Italy. But my financial means do not permit me to take advantage of the urgent advice given me, nor can I live in a style becoming the widow of the Chief Magistrate of a great nation, although I live as economically as I can. In consideration of the great services my deeply lamented husband has rendered to the United States, and of the fearful loss I have sustained by his untimely death—his martyrdom, may say—I respectfully submit to your honorable body this petition. Hoping that a yearly pension may be granted me, so that I may have less pecuniary care, I remain, most respectfully,

"Thomas went with me to Cuba. He gazed on the Atlantic ocean with amazement, and was in a great terror when we launched our little boat, but his fidelity proved stronger than his fears, and he embarked with me. I succeeded in sending him back to his friends from Havana, although he wished to remain with me, and declared that if ever I returned he would find me out and live with me. The last I heard of him he was solicited to become a candidate for some Convention in Arkansas; but, after inquiring what a convention was, he declined the honor."

Well may "our colored brethren exclaim" "Save me from my friends." An Alabam correspondent says:

In the Legislature the negro again came up to dry, on a motion of Mr. Murphy, of New York, to take the resolution from the table appointing Stephen Myers an extra doorkeeper. Additional resolutions amendatory and explanatory were passed in by the Radicals, and after a little filibustering Mr. Husted, of Westchester, offered a resolution that the whole subject be laid upon the table. The ayes and nays being called on, the Radicals voted almost unanimously in favor of squelching the whole thing. The negro question may, therefore, be considered practically settled.

The moduity of the negro was fairly exhibited in New Orleans the other day. A wag started a story that a wealthy colored woman had sold and left five dollars apiece to every colored person in the city, application to be made for the same at the Presbyterian Church, on Gasquet street. The story spread like wildfire, and for seven hours, hundreds of negro men and women, of all ages, the former with their favorite clubs and the latter with their lunch baskets took up a position on Gasquet street, around the church. It was late in the day before this queer-looking assemblage dispersed.

Orrell, just north of Boney Bridge and corner of Fourth and Hanover streets, in flames.
