The National Intelligencer, after reviewing the administration of President Johnson, closed with the following eulogy:—
"He has always been regarded as the ship and holding no man back in his true dissolution. And as will history set down to our latest record, it is evident, took on three planks and pronounced otherwise. The ready men among us may appreciate the motives of Andrew Johnson to-day or to-morrow; they may not appreciate his struggles and self-sacrifice; nor the exalted conscience which has sustained him; but will not their children and their children's children differ in judgment on this man from their passionate and prejudiced ancestors?"

Posterity will see a logic in his conduct whose premises are deeply rooted in the Constitution of the United States, and in the example of the good fathers of the Republic. They will fail to trace a taint of selfishness or bad ambition in his action. They will read his state papers, and reflect upon them, and thank him for the wise, able structure of thought which they create.

FORBES AND CHILDREN OVER TWELVE YEARS OF AGE.—White Mr. Bentwell is urging, by act of Congress, negro suffrage upon Ohio, Pennsylvania, New York, and other States, Mr. Brooks, in order to symboles and realize Mr. B. utwell's principles, proposes, we see, not only to enfranchise the negroes now in the United States, as well as the negroes, but also all the women and maidens over twelve years of age.
