### A SENATOR THAT HAS GOT RICH.

HOLD HIM.

A sage-brush editor in Nevada, upon taking charge of a newspaper recently, laid down the law in the following style, that his editorial brethren might govern themselves accordingly: "A single word by way of introduction to the members of the editorial brotherhood, with whom I shall hereafter claim fellowship, and may have done. The Legislature of the State of Delaware has elected to the United States Senate the two Bayards, father and son—the father to the unexpired term of Gov. Samsbury; son to succeed the father. There has never, we believe, been a case precisely similar to this in the history of the country. There were two Bayards in the Senate at the same time—father and son—but one represented the State of Wisconsin, and the other the State of Iowa. In this instance the father and son are elected by the same Legislative body to represent the same State. What is still more remarkable is that the immediate ancestor of the Bayards—the father of the present Senator—was likewise a member of the Senate; and his elder son, Richard H. Bayard, who died within twelve months, served in the U. S. Senate at intervals from 1830 to 1845. Thus there have been four Senators in this one family, representing the State of Delaware. The youngest of the line, Thomas F. Bayard, who takes his place next March, is said to be an eminent lawyer, and to possess capacity and acquirements reflecting credit on the distinguished family of which he is a member.

**THE SIAMESE TWINS AND THE PROPOSED SEPARATION.**—An English paper says: "The object which Chang and Eng, otherwise known as the Siamese Twins, had in view in visiting Edinburgh was to obtain the advice of Professor Syme as to the advisability of severing the inter-communis band by which they have been so long held together. Last week Chang and Eng waited on Professor Syme at the University for this purpose. After a careful examination, Professor Syme was strongly of opinion that such an operation would prove highly dangerous to their lives, and accordingly advised that the operation should not be performed. Sir James Y. Simpson, Bart., also entertains the same view, and the opinions of the two learned Professors may, we think, be taken as conclusive evidence on this highly debatable point. It is intended, however, to take the opinion of a Paris Professor on the subject, but, doubtless, the opinions of the two Northern professors will have considerable weight with the two brothers in whatever course they may ultimately adopt."

A new and very dangerous "informal" machine has been invented and "successfully tried in San Francisco." A street car partially filled with passengers was thrown violently from the track one evening. All hands supposed at first that it was another earthquake. A search, for the cause of the disturbance revealed an exploded torpedo firmly fastened to the rail of the track. In general appearance it resembles an old-fashioned watch, being about two inches in diameter and five-eighths of an inch thick. It was composed of Russian sheet-iron, with two strong clamps of lead, by which it was secured to the rail of the track. Fixed in the interior of the torpedo and nearly reaching the upper surface were three gun nipples soldered to the lower plates. These were armed with ordinary percussion caps, and were exploded by the car wheel passing over them. The machine was fired, of course, with some powerful explosive mixture. The whole affair is shrouded in mystery. The object aimed at was no doubt to see what an explosion of that character directly under the wheel of a car would effect. The recklessness which prompted the inventor to dare to construct the very dangerous device points indirectly to the probability that others of a larger calibre may be put
