THE 22ND CONVENTION DENIED THE

RIGHT TO APPLY FOR PASSPORTS—TELEGRAPHED TO WASHINGTON FOR INSTRUCTIONS—PROGRESS OF THE REVOLUTION—HAVANA IN A STATE OF SIEGE—POLITICAL ARRESTS—ABRIVAL OF REINFORCEMENTS FROM SPAIN.

HAVANA, February 19.—The United States' Consul having applied for passports for a naturalized citizen, the latter was arrested, and the Consul was informed that the Government could not recognize his right to apply for passports.

The Consul has telegraphed to Washington for the prompt intervention of the Government to protect its citizens, and, in case of his refusal, tendering his resignation.

General Duice has released the native of Cuba, who was arrested yesterday, on his producing his American naturalization papers.

The principal American residents in Clefouge have applied for a war vessel for their protection. An answer was returned that it was impossible to send them one at this time.

The City of Havana is practically in a state of siege.

General Dulce has been urged to formally declare a state of siege, but is yet dilatory. He, however, may issue a proclamation to that effect after the expiration of the armistice of amnesty.

Cubans are applying daily to be permitted to take refuge on board the flag-ship Coquocook, in case trouble should break out in the city and their lives be threatened.

Admiral Hoff has consented to take American residents to Key West.

The engineers employed on the jurisdiction of San Antonio have arrived here. He reports that a party of insurgents, three hundred strong, invaded that district. The plantation hands fled panic stricken, and work on the estates had ceased.

Plantation owners have also fled either from the North Atlantic region, or other parts of the island, fearing they may be impressed into the military service.

A letter from Trinidad, dated the 18th, instant, says the Cubans have raised the standard of revolt, destroyed the telegraph, destroyed the telegraph line, and stopped the mails. A dispatch from Nu-Vitas, dated February 11, reports that banditti are plaguing the estates in the country.

On the 7th a detachment of troops marched from Nu-Vitas to Miguel Buco, burnt the town, and returned next day, having lost twenty in killed, wounded and prisoners.

The insurgents firmly hold their ground in the vicinity of the town.

Negroes are wandering about the country without restraint.

There are many Spaniards in the insurement ranks.

At Puerto's Principle provisions are scarce, and the inhabitants are threatened with famine. The roads between Puerto Principe and Nu-Vitas are impassable, owing to heavy rains. One hundred soldiers are sick in the hospital at Nu-Vitas.

HAVANA, February 17.—Transports arrived in the harbor, to day, with reinforcements of regular troops from Spain.

The number of arrests, for political causes, are daily increasing.

Several officials have been thrown into prison on suspicion of revolutionary proclivities.

Engagements between the troops and rebels are reported to have taken place near Trinidad, Cienfuegos and Esperito Santo.

The Diaries states that the insurgents near Sagua la Grande are completely surrounded by the Government troops, and will be forced to surrender.

The Government has received intelligence of a rising in the vicinity of Matanzas. The rebels number over three hundred men. The greatest alarm prevails there.

Santo Domingo, the Director of the Savings Bank, has been arrested. The police are searching after other wealthy and suspected men.

RADICAL ASSAULT UPON GENERAL GRANT.

Testimony accumulates to the effect that General Grant's late little speech gives great umbrage to the Radical leaders. We quote from the Washington correspondent of the Chicago Tribune as follows:

General Grant's little speech of Saturday morning is the subject of much talk here. He spoke with great deliberation, and had evidently well weighed his words. The best class of public men are entirely satisfied with the General's reticence about his Cabinet, but a number of pulled up, and some quizzical Congressmen rail against him with a good deal of bitterness, and talk about their rights as the immediate representatives of the people, and the necessity of showing him that he cannot run the Government alone so long. Those most in the General's confidence say that his remarks about individuals in connection with his appointments which must be made at so early day do not indicate any less disinterest choosing the right men for civil officers than he showed in selecting good agents for doing his work when at the head of the army during the war.

INTERESTING CASE.—We find in the Richmond Dispatch, of Thursday, the following statement in an important case now pending in Judge Underwood's Court:

United States Circuit Court—Judge Underwood Presiding.

J. E. Leary ex. McNamee, Son & Co., of Petersburg, Va., and Hardy & Brother, of Norfolk, Va., two suits in defense. It appears that the plaintiff in these very important suits, in the State of North Carolina, in the year 1853, placed in the hands of Hardy & Brother, of Norfolk, a large lot of cotton, with instructions to sell it, not to sell the same at the price, and in the currency then prevailing, but to hold the same. A short time prior to the execution of Norfolk his cotton was by Hardy & Brother sold to McNamee & Co., of Petersburg, with instructions, in the then previous time, to do with the same "as it were his own." The investing of the city of Petersburg by the Federal forces, and the subsequent blockade, induced the Masters, McNamee & Co., to sell, which they did at \$25, realizing some \$30,000 for cotton. Therefore the plaintiff vs.

The case has been warmly contested and

ably argued by Judge Bearrough and Major Deppen, of Norfolk, and Captain John Lyon, of Petersburg, for the defendants, and by Colonel William Gordon, of this city, for the plaintiff. The jury, after long deliberation, came into court at a late hour on Tuesday night, and, having failed to agree, were discharged.

The District Court, it will be noted, has directed a new trial, if our reader to learn that work upon the new Battle Church will very shortly be commenced.
