THE NEGRO ASSASSIN.

On yesterday evening, at half-past two o'clock, Edwin Belcher, the negro Assessor of Internal Revenue for the third District, and son of the Honorable Justice of the Supreme Court, was arrested on a warrant issued by United States Commissioner Davis, for an alleged assault. At the same time, and at the same place, Rogers A. Corey, also arrested on the same charge as his chief—indeed, Corey is the principal in the alleged offense, while Belcher is an accessory. The charge on which Corey was arrested was willfully destroying Government papers made out by a former Assistant Assessor, for the purpose of injuring the latter. The charge against Belcher was being an accessory of Corey's to the transaction. The parties accused appeared before United States Commissioner Davis, yesterday evening, at four o'clock. The Commissioner being desirous of having present at the District Attorney, J. M. W. Smith, the District Attorney, and as the latter was sick and unable to attend, a further hearing of the case was postponed until this morning, at eleven o'clock, and the accused released until that time upon their own recognizance. The facts connected with this case we learn to be as follows:

Some time since Mr. F. M. Lottin, an Assistant Assessor, was suspended from office by the late Assessor, Col. J. W. Bowen, with, as he claims, four or five months pay still due him. Shortly after this Lottin preferred charges against Bowen and a trial was held at the Planters Hotel before the Supervisor, M. J. Seifford, at which the books of Lottin and his abstracts were produced in evidence. After the investigation those books and vouchers were returned by order of Mr. Seifford to the Assistant Assessor's office. On the removal of Bowen and the installation of Belcher, Lottin applied to the latter for his salary for the time which he had served, as established by his books. Belcher replied that he could not pay him until he produced his vouchers, as the latter were not in his office. Lottin then wrote to the Supervisor at Washington about his papers and received a reply stating that his accounts were just as established by the vouchers he had returned to Belcher's office. On the receipt of this letter Lottin again called on Belcher and demanded his vouchers. Belcher replied that he had none and the books he knew nothing of the vouchers. Lottin insisted that they were in the office, when Corey came forward and acknowledged that he had destroyed the vouchers, and that he was responsible for his action. Belcher, at this, said that if Corey had destroyed them he (Belcher) would take the responsibility, as he was determined to sustain his subordinates in this action. On last Thursday Lottin again called on Belcher and asked him to sign a certificate that he had the books and had found their contents as showing service rendered the Government; that the monthly lists (vouchers) have been in the possession of Corey, and that the latter acknowledged having destroyed them. This Belcher refused to do on the ground that should Lottin sue Corey for damages the signing this certificate would make him (Lottin) a witness against his Assistant. Upon this Lottin took a warrant for the arrest of the parties as above described. This case will come up before the Commissioner at eleven o'clock this morning.

THE TIME TO CUT HAY.

WOODVIEW, JEFFERSON CO., Ky., April 25, 1869.

Dear Sir—In the March number of your paper you give an interesting article on the "Time to cut hay," upon which I beg to offer a few suggestions. You state that on a certain meadow in our county a portion of a good meadow crop of timothy was cut last summer during the last week in June, the grass was quite full-blown, a portion of it was cut at an earlier date, the portion cut from the meadow was cut during the intermediate space, the work being commenced on the last one week later than on the portion not in full bloom. You say further that at the time of writing (probably February), the portion of the meadow sown in the whole space, that is, the intermediate cutting, the stand upon those parts first cut is very much injured by the drying out of the plants, and that the only part of the whole meadow which now promises a future crop as good as that of the first cut, is the portion cut at the latest date. You say from this that the intermediate cutting of the two first cut portions of the meadow caused the destruction in one case, and the injury in the other, of the plants subjected to this treatment, while the earlier cutting of the first ripe portion was probably the cause of its destruction from drought.
