LETTER TO MR. BEECHER

By Henry Ward Beecher, Brooklyn.

Sir— I have just read your letter of the 17th April, 1869, relating to the change in circulation of the paper you are carrying away from Charleston, in 1865, the records of Mr. Mitchell's trial, etc., in which you say that you took nothing away but a heavy heart, that a city of your own country should be so utterly destroyed by war. Again, you say that you think yourself brought away an old family Bible, which had been saved from a burning house on some plantation, and presented to you by an officer of a colored regiment, all the facts connected with which you entered on the fly leaf, thinking that after peace came the family might perhaps be happy to regain this memorable old book, printed in 1870, etc.

Now, my dear sir, the confession that you left Charleston with a heavy heart because of its utter desolation by war, comes with a bad grace from one who, while he could have done much to have averted the ravages of war, did all he could to precipitate and aggravate it with all its horrors, by denouncing the pulpits in which you officiated by a tirade of abuse every Sabbath against the South, and instead of extending the olive branch of peace, you were calling for the rifle and the sword to be used in the most ferocious manner against those for whom you now possess sympathy. But the Bible—that book from which you pretend to speak words of consolation, peace and rectitude to a dying world, you secretly recite as a present from an negro, knowing at the same time that it did not belong to him or yourself, that it was stolen property, and that you had no more right, legally or morally to take and hold it as your own than you had to have availed yourself of the darkness of the night and gone into the house of your unsuspecting victim and feloniously taken and carried it away.

Again, you say that after peace came, this family (to whom it belonged) might perhaps be happy to regain this venerable old book, printed in 1870. Did you ever make an effort to make that family happy by informing any member of it, through your press or otherwise, that you had it, and was ready to restore it? Did you ever use any means to enable them to regain it? No, your own letter carries a denial of that fact on its face, and the first awakening in finance that struck your divinity was the denning of your friend, that charges were made against you—that you had seized and made off with said book. And it was only to relieve yourself from the odium of the charge of their robbery, that your moral sense became aroused in action. In the same way, the thief, when tracked to his den with a stolen property, gives it up, when concealment is no longer profitable.

It is worthy of a negro or a Yankee preacher, and you are a member of a church under the same circumstances, that might have been some excuse, but when you put your hand upon that sacred book, and conceived the thought of self-appropriation, you should have thought of the fate of Annanias and Sapphira, for you were guilty of an offense in the sight of Heaven more heinous and offensive, for they concealed from their own hearts, while you feloniously took and concealed God's Holy Book and ordinances, which says, in burning words, "Thou shalt not steal."

Keep the book and read it. Perhaps you may, while examining it for curiosity, be directed by the all seeing eye to some paragraph which has stood as a beacon to the wrong for two hundred years, and may lead you from the shores and quays to which you are by "rights" with railroad engines. And if this plan be impossible, you may at least become acquainted with the commandment which says, thou shalt not steal; thou shalt not cover.

Keep the book and when you die, leave it as a legacy to your children. Doubtless if they are proper representatives of the father, they will cherish it as a treasure gained in the same manner, and will circulate it to those who will receive it as an inheritance. A SOUTHERN MAN.

A CHARGE OF OFFICIAL MALFEASANCE AGAINST THE PRESIDENT.

The New York World, of Friday, prefers the following charge of official malfeasance in selling the "protection" office for his own benefit, by General Grant. It is of those charges which must be met. We trust, for the honor of the country, it will be met, for never was more infamous a charge brought against a President of the United States. The trouble which Grant is experiencing in reference to the appointments for office in the District of Columbia, according to all reports, arises from the acts on the part of the President in making his own appointments to the office of the District of Columbia, to the public that Grant retroactively sold his house in Washington to Mr. Scyles J. Bowen, formerly Postmaster, for for \$7,000,000, dollars, entered into a contract to deliver the title, and Mr. Bowen paid the usual ten per cent. to find the balance. Subsequently a sum of \$60,000 was raised in New York to purchase the house for General Sherman, and the balance was paid to those parties, but he has been unable to transfer the title, and the contract with Bowen in the way, as that gentleman insisting that the property was his, and he the only person who could sell it. Mr. Bowen was willing to sell the house to the nation, but had given the money for the price named, but then by his own act he refused to do so, and so nullified the contract. After this promise had been made, and the paper signed for Bowen, the value of the twenty-five thousand dollars extra on the house again came up.
