A NIGHT OF HORROR.
A remarkable case of Human Animation—A Woman Supposed to be Dead Created a Midnight Feast.

One of the most remarkable instances of human animation which has ever taken place in this city, occurred on Sunday night last in Varick street, near McDougal, the particulars of which are as follows: An aged lady, named Rebecca Townsend, who has been ailing for several weeks past, expired last. That she really was dead, no one who saw her for a moment hesitated to believe. The next day, the rigid limbs, and the apparent cessation of respiration, all pointed to the supposed fact that death had come to the relief of the invalid. Accordingly, on Sunday the morning household, acting on this belief, commenced making preparations for the burial of the body. A burial permit was obtained, a coffin of oak red, and the remains washed and stored in the bath-tubs of the grave—delay arising relative to the preparation of the coffin, the remains were temporarily laid out upon the bed in which the old lady was supposed to have died, and the services of a watchman (a young female residing in a neighboring house) were secured to attend the body during Sunday night.

About 11 o'clock on Sunday evening the watchman, who had been stationed to watch the body alone at her disagreeable task. As the young lady slept she became uneasy about 2 o'clock in the morning, and commencing herself in an arm-chair a short distance from the bed, soon fell into a deep sleep. She had not slept above an hour, when she was awakened by a low moaning sound, which apparently issued from the couch upon which lay the supposed corpse. She started up, and perceived the water immediately spring from her chair, and approached the bed for the purpose of ascertaining the cause of the mysterious sounds. At this moment the noise suddenly ceased. There lay the corpse just as the watchman left it one hour before, the eyes still set in death, the limbs still rigid, and not a sign of life visible. Evidently the noise which she fancied she had heard was but her fancy conjured up by a mind excited by the uncomfortable position in which she was placed, the watchman returned to her seat, and resumed her nap; she had not remained in this condition more than half an hour, when she was again aroused by sounds similar to those which had previously alarmed her. Again she sprang from her chair and approached the bed, when, horror of horrors, her eyes met the manifest signs of a supposed corpse. Could it be possible that she was dreaming? She passed her hands to her eyes to convince herself that she did not sleep. Slowly the eyes of the corpse commenced rolling in their sockets, the muscles of the face relaxed, the jaws contracted, and countenance of the woman, still up right in bed, at the foot of which lay the convulsed form of the terror-stricken watchman.

The nurse occasioned by the fall awoke the inmates of the house, who hastened to the scene.
