A MODERN BLENDING.

Dr. Duval is the man who figured in a conspicuously last fall in the city of Ocala. His name of treatment was not by the use of medicine, but by manipulations, or, to borrow the phrase used by the hands, and in this way he advertised to cure diseases of all descriptions. After he had done these things, he was, it is said, very much satisfied that he was an impostor and a scoundrel of the blackest dye, and he signed a request asking him to leave as they were satisfied that he was obtaining money under false pretences. After the publication of this request, with the name attached, in the Ocala Journal, a division arose with regard to the matter—those easily duped and the more intelligent and sound minded against him. A few days after this he left the Ocala Hotel, and took up lodgings at the house of Mr. Sterling, as they were his warmest friends, probably from two causes: one through sympathy, and the other from a cure which had been effected by him on Mrs. Sterling. He stayed there some two or three weeks, and then married a woman, Mrs. Sterling, who was living with her at the time. Soon after this he left for Rochester, and practiced there his humbuggery for a number of weeks, and then left for another town.

The first we heard of him after leaving Rochester was at Janesville, Wisconsin, which was about the 1st of April. After being at the public house for a few days, he and his wife retired for the night as usual, well and in good spirits. About 2 o'clock, A. M., he gave the alarm that his wife was very sick, and on going into his room he lay in bed cold and dead. There being suspicious of something wrong, the citizens concluded that they would take out the stomach and send it to Chicago for examination, and the chemists reported back that large quantities of strychnine were found in it, and some in particular they were not yet identified. Dr. Duval was then arrested and lodged in jail. Some two weeks ago the grand jury issued a bill of indictment against him for murder, and he was brought into court and pleaded not guilty. The case was then laid over for trial at the next court for Rock county, and he was remanded to jail. Since his confinement we learn that this is his fifth wife, and all the others have died in a similar manner. It is reported that his wives are to be disinterred and their stomachs examined.

From the News and Farmer.
Messrs. Editors—As you are giving advice to farmers, perhaps you will not object to my "pickings up" by the way-side, or experience in the test of all things at last. Mine is the experience of a successful farmer. In the first place I will give you my treatment for.

THE BOO CHOLERA.
"In 1861 or 1862," says another farmer, "I lost nearly 100 hogs by cholera: when one commenced ailing, I looked upon it as dead. Again this winter it attacked them, and I thought I would try what virtue there was in turpentine. I gave one pint of turpentine in one week to fifteen head of hogs; gave it in a cup at different times through the week. They all lived and did finely, and I see no more signs of cholera. I think from the way the turpentine acted, that one half the quantity I gave in this length of time would have been sufficient." This agrees with my own experience, though it is limited. I have lost some hogs by cholera. The last experiment by me proved a success. The hog was so far exhausted by the disease that I could walk to him, and take hold of him. I thought him gone, but concluded to experiment a little. I took a small quantity of epon sassa, castor oil, turpentine, and lard; put these ingredients into a pint cup, mixed with a full cup of water, and warmed it over the coals until all was well mixed. I then drenched the hog with one-half, and gave the other half by injection. He was well in a day or two. I have faith in turpentine.

APPLE TREE WORMS.
Don't burn out these pests. If your trees are young, you will kill the tops. But mix well a pint of new soap with a pint of moderately strong lye. Apply with a broom to the trunk and larger limbs. This will not only destroy the worms, but make the tree grow.

Red pepper, steeped in elder, is a good preventive, and a certain cure for purple sore throat.
