*DEBT NOT DECREASED.*

We see it frequently asserted by Radical papers, that the national blessing is being decreased year after year, month after month, and week after week, but we fail to see the force of such cantankerous talk. Taxes are getting higher all the while, and we read of millions of revenue coming in each day, yet the debt has steadily increased since the close of the war, in 1865, until now it is over \$200,000,000 more than it was then.

The papers and the laboring classes very properly ask: "Why is this?" and "murmur among themselves." It is because of dishonesty, of needlessly protracting Indian wars, of voting treasure to every little enterprise, of keeping black men in idleness.

Large taxes necessitate a large expenditure to collect the same, as there is an expensive army of assessors, collectors, and those who watch to prevent fraud, but who are always willing to "divide."

Years ago the party now in power denounced the Democratic administration as extravagant, when it only cost the country about \$90,000,000 a year, and now four times that sum is spent annually by each Radical administration.

Statements recently published by the Treasury Department furnish some startling facts. By them it appears that, on the 1st of April, 1865, the public debt amounted to \$2,862,650,076.84. The receipts into the Treasury from that day to the 1st of November 1868, from all sources of revenue, reached the enormous sum of \$1,666,476,062.20.—The increase of the public debt from the first day of April, 1865, to the first day of November, 1868, was \$169,374,475.48.—Add this sum to the revenue receipts, and the total amount received by the government from all sources, from the 1st of April, 1865, to the 1st of November, 1868, make a total of \$4,822,650,537.69. Estimating the revenues from November 1, 1868, to June 1, 1869, to be in the same ratio that they were the previous year, the total revenues received by the Treasury from April 1, 1865, to June 1, 1869, will top up \$2,600,650,537.69, or nearly five hundred millions annually. The figures of the Treasury Department show that the debt of the country has increased, since the close of the war, to the amount stated below:

Total debt June 1, 1865.....\$2,862,650,076.84  
Total debt April 1, 1865.....\$2,862,650,076.84

Increase.....\$266,715,555.76

What a comment on honest administration and Radical financing! This thing must end, and will in final repudiation.—It is the only loophole left for the people to get out of the meshes of Radicalism, and the sooner it comes the quicker the calm and dawn of prosperity.

**THE SWANNOANO CHEESE MANUFACTORY.**

In company with a few friends, on Friday last we paid a visit to the second Cheese Factory established in the mountains of Western North Carolina, located about two miles Southeast of Asheville, in the beautiful Swannano Valley, and directly on the Morganton road.

This factory is owned by W. McDowell, G. B. Tennent, Monty Hatch, John Murphy, John Cheshire & Son, Reed, six of the best farmers in Buncombe county, who own fine farms in the vicinity.

Mr. Jacob Becker from Herkimer, the celebrated cheese county of New York, assisted by his excellent "better half," is the Manager and manufacturer; and we take occasion to congratulate the Company in securing the services of such competent and truly worthy persons to conduct the details of their enterprise.

The first cheese was made at this factory on the 27th day of May last. The product of that day was 50 lbs. The daily production has steadily increased since then, and it now amounts to 150 lbs. The aggregate amount made from the 27th of May to the 27th of June is a little over 5,000 lbs. This, we think, is doing well for the first month, particularly when we consider that five Sabbath days occurred on which no cheese was made.

Of the quality of the cheese we are unable to speak, as yet, as it requires at least 60 days to cure and become fit for use.—But judging from the truly rich appearance of their outside, we never saw a more superb lot of cheeses than our friend Becker exhibited to us in the curing room of the Swannano factory.

Our space admonishes us to be brief, and we, therefore, postpone the extended account we had prepared. We will give it in our next.

We cannot close this short notice without returning the sincere thanks of the whole party to Mr. and Mrs. Becker for their kindness and attention to us during our visit.

**A MAN WHO HAS NOT SLEPT FOR FOUR YEARS.**

A very singular case of wakefulness has just been brought to our notice. Joseph Herr, a cabinet maker, about 60 years of age, has not had a full hour's continuous sleep for four years. The case was thus stated to us: About four years since a daughter of Mr. Herr became very ill and Mr. H. watched at her bed side day and night, for six weeks, when she died. All this time he took no sleep, stating that he felt no desire for it. A few days after the death of his daughter, he ran a half mile to his shop, and this confined him to his bed for seven or eight weeks, not an hour of which time could he obtain sleep. After a recovery from his wound he still failed to obtain rest from sleep, and so the matter continued to go on from week to month, and from month to year. His health suffered and he complained of great debility. He applied to a leading physician of this city, who prescribed a powerful opiate, but it had no more effect upon him, as he says, than a snap of his fingers. He again applied to the same physician, requesting that the dose be increased. To this the physician objected, stating that it would be dangerous. He said he did not care, and another opiate was prepared strong enough, it is alleged, to put three or four ordinary men to sleep and never wake up again.—This had no better effect than the first, and the physician refused to administer any more doses of that kind, but advised his patient, as a last resort, to get on a "high old bender." This experiment has not yet been tried, and it may be a question whether he can swallow enough liquor to produce intoxication and a paroxysm.

Mr. Herr is a sober and industrious man, but in consequence of his malady is unable to do any kind of physical labor. It is a certainly a strange case.
