NORTH CAROLINA BONDS IN NEW YORK. A correspondent of the Wilmington Star writes from New York, under date of Aug. 25th, as follows in regard to the sale of N. C. State Bonds:

The Stock Board was made lively yesterday by the introduction of a new class of North Carolina bonds, described as a special tax bond. An offer of fifty-one cents showed confidence at once in these securities.

The improvement is due to Andrew Jones, who, by some kind of management, has succeeded in getting the bonds into this market. The Board, however, has no objection to the sale of these securities, but the market will make an important difference to the tax-payers in the State, say, nearly a million. When it is considered that this change has been accomplished in the last few days, it proves skillful work on the part of Jones.

As was expected, the telegraph brings us intelligence of a democratic triumph in the State of California. From what we can gather from our dispatches, the Democrats have elected their local tickets throughout the State generally, by handsome and decided majorities, and also secured nearly two-thirds of the legislative delegation.

The bonds sell at about fifty-five cents in the dollar, gold, and yet these men continue to sell the bonds and expect the people to pay them dollar for dollar with all the accumulation of interest! Can't you see all the mischief and the "Ring"? We tell the people another thing just here:

The passage of these Railroad appropriations by the State, the people of North Carolina, have been a great success. This money was paid in bonds to "carpet-baggers" and degenerate North Carolinians to their pockets, and they in turn converted the bonds into the hands of the "Ring."
