**THE ALLIAN TRIAL.—**The Jury in this case were out until yesterday, (Monday) evening, and failed to agree on a verdict. We understand the Jury stood 9 for manslaughter and 3 for acquittal. Late yesterday the Judge had them called in, when the prisoner not being present in person or by counsel, a Juror was withdrawn and a mistrial declared.

We learn that the prisoner's counsel will move for his final discharge this morning, on the ground that he cannot be tried a second time for the same offense. In case of the Court's refusal to grant the motion, an appeal to the Supreme Court will be taken, where we are warranted by precedent to conclude, the motion will be sustained.

**THE "PEASER" COTTON.—**Dr. O. L. Ellis has sent us a sample of the "Peaser" cotton raised on his farm in Franklin county, the seed of which he procured from Vicksburg last winter. This sample has very long staples and the fiber is much finer and silkier than our common cotton, the yield to the acre being about the same.

The "Peaser" cotton is considered in the market as next to quality to the "Sea Island," and sold, last year, for about fifteen cents per pound more than middling staples, the difference being sufficient to pay the expense of cultivation.

Dr. Ellis, in a note accompanying the sample, says he will have 50 pounds of this cotton in the seed at our State Fair, to contend for the premium for best 50 pounds seed cotton.

The Doctor further says, "I would also contest for one or more premiums on fine stock, but the premiums should not be very small for the amount of trouble and risk."

With all due respect, Doctor, we think you take a wrong view of the matter. We should always have poor Fair, if the amount of premiums offered were the judgment to exhibition. We cannot afford to let the natural advantages that accrue to all participants in these industrial exhibitions, in a short paragraph like this; they will no doubt occur to you on a little reflection, and we hope you will consider the matter and bring your fine stock to the Fair.

We have heard of others who entertain the same objection to exhibit, who, we hope, will consider better of the matter by next week.

Sales of Cotton in Charlotte last week amounted to 350 bales.

The Asheville Pioneer says that the Director of the Western N. C. R. have made a proposition to the Cincinnati, Charleston and Cumberland R. R. to complete the unfinished portion of that road, and that the proposition has been accepted.
