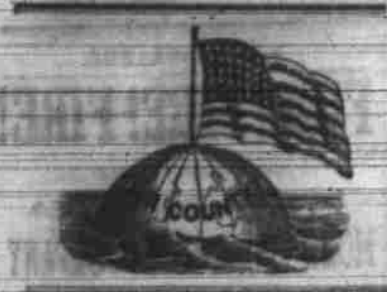

LARCENY AND THE LEAGUES.

If we wanted evidence other than that furnished by the history of France, Spain, and Mexico, of the iniquity of secret political societies, we have it in the history of the South and the present condition of each and all of the Southern States, and especially of North Carolina, whether we look at her Executive, Legislative or Judicial condition.

We have heretofore noticed the iniquity of all personal property in Orange, the larceny, arson, and rapes committed by one secret society, and the retaliation by whipping and hanging, on the part of another. We have often expressed our sorrow and condemnation of both.

The League has enjoyed this salutary change in the law; our comfortable jail houses have been filled with them all over the State.

On the eve of the election last summer, Major Smith made a common jail delivery in several counties, by going back for League men there confined.

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STILL AT THEIR WORK.

We were led to believe, last week, that the quartering of negro militia at Abram Scott's in White Oak District, in this county, was done by an ignorant Magistrate without Governor Holden's knowledge or sanction, and that he had already, or would immediately, give orders and have them dispersed, but it seems our informant was misled, for, instead of this irresponsible being recalled, they are there yet, and are daily increasing in number by new recruits.

We mentioned last week, some of their acts of lawlessness and violence, of which, we know, Governor Holden was duly notified by reliable persons from the neighborhood, such as their raid upon the dwelling of Mrs. Branch, a respectable widow lady, taking her daughter violently from her sleeping room and leading her out in her night clothes among the rabble that had forced their way into the house; their firing a number of bullets through the door of a peaceable and quiet citizen, while his family were in the house; their visiting the premises of Mr. McNeil in his absence and fighting the female with threats of death, and other cowardly and outrageous acts.

We were informed yesterday by a respectable citizen of the county, that on Thursday night last, six of this crowd of negro militia went to the house of a widow lady, in the vicinity of their camp, forcibly dragged her daughter, a beautiful and respectable young girl, from the house to the woods, and there violated her person in the most brutal and shocking manner. The name of the family is in our possession, but we for fear to give it publicity, out of regard to them.

These things, if they are as they have been represented to us, cannot continue; if Governor Holden does not stop these and punish the perpetrators, he will be responsible before God and man for the results. What we stated in regard to the lawless actions of this rabble, has been fully and publicly corroborated by gentlemen of undoubted veracity from that section of the county, both by Democrats and Republicans; and as we have stated above, the Governor was informed of the facts, last week, but simply referred the gentleman who told him of them, to his Adjutant General. We were told by a gentleman, on Friday last, that the Governor declared this militia was sent there by a Magistrate without his order; but he cannot plead ignorance of the fact; and we can furnish him the names of respectable parties, to substantiate the fact of their crimes and outrages, if he wants them. We learn there were some persons out there last week investigating the affair, but nothing so far has come of it, and if the statements of the deplorables above are taken, we don't suppose anything ever will.

These troops are simply carrying out the instructions of the "Legislative Address," and the North Carolina Standard—the one advised the negroes not to go hungry when there was corn in the fields and hogs running at large; the other, in the article "Work," told them how to work; pointed out the wives, sisters and daughters of Southern homes as legitimate game for their hellish passions. They have learned these lessons well, and now the storm is raging, the agitators can't control it, even if they had a disposition to do so. Well may the Standard exclaim—well may we all exclaim—"How long! O Lord, how long!"

A CHRISTIAN WOMAN TORTURED BY CHAINS.

A Catholic paper in England gives the following account of an incident which it says recently occurred at Caston: A native Christian woman, much respected by the Christians, and even by the pagans who were acquainted with her, has devoted herself for twenty years to the rescuing and baptizing infants abandoned by their parents. At the beginning of July she was arrested on the charge of practicing sorcery upon young children, and of taking out their eyes, the marrow of their bones, and even their souls, with a view to the preparation of magical remedies. She was several times savagely beaten on the face with leather straps to induce her to confess her guilt. In the midst of her tortures, however, she maintained the greatest courage and constancy in confessing the truth. She was condemned to death, and it was feared the sentence would be immediately executed. Upon this M. Girardin, resident missionary, succeeded in obtaining entrance to the prison, heard her confession, and administered to her the holy Viaticum, which she refused to accept. This was reported, and the Mayor spread a report that the case would be carried by appeal to Paris. But in the meantime the population were excited to fresh violence, and the mandarin subjected the accused to fresh examinations, forcing her to remain for many hours kneeling upon iron chains.
