**GUN DOCKERY AT THE CAPITOL.—The address of Gun Dockery at the Capitol last night was delivered by a very large audience. The old "war horse" spoke in his great, bold and independent style, and showed that he was not seriously frightened at the recent threats of the Standard, but was disposed in person his duty in the position he occupies as a member of the Penitentiary Board, in a fearless and an honest manner. He claimed to be a Republican, and told his party friends some wholesome truths, and some which, perhaps, they did not relish very well.**

He stated that \$20,000 of the \$50,000 appropriation for the Penitentiary, had already been used, and a further amount drawn on to purchase supplies. He invited investigation into the manner in which the Board had performed their duties, and insisted that further appropriations must be made, or the work would soon have to stop. We will adduce further to the remarks of Gen. Dockery.

**That War Cotton.—We are requested to say that the affair of the wet cotton, noticed by us a few days ago, has been adjusted in all the cases except the one bale from this country. The following explanation is given:**

The persons who attended the gin where the cotton was picked, being inexperienced, sprinkled the cotton, as he states, to lay the dust in the last room, and thinks he sprinkled it too heavily, without intending it. The probability is that he had an eye to the turn-over, in order to render his gin popular. It has given a sworn certificate that the owners of the cotton had no hand in it or knew anything about it. They have come forward like honest men, returned the money they received for the cotton, with all expense of its transportation. Of the Wake county case nothing has been done yet. We hope for the honor of our county and the prosperity of our market, that this, too, will be satisfactorily arranged.

"God in the Ocean," is the subject of Prof. B. Adams Lee's Lecture at Tucker Hall, Friday night, instead of Thursday night, as we had it in yesterday morning's issue. The Ladies of the Memorial Association have been indefatigable in the holy cause in which they have engaged of giving sepulture to the Southern dead who fell in the struggle for southern independence, and in ornamenting their last resting places. They ask the co-operation of those who sympathize with them in their labor. To further the object they have in view, that of erecting a monument to the memory of our Southern heroes and to beautify and keep in order the cemetery where they sleep, Prof. Lee has, at their solicitation, consented to deliver the Lecture, as announced above, the proceeds of which go in the funds of the Association. The Lecture will be well worth the admission price, independent of the considerations we have alluded to, and, surely, both combined will draw together a crowded audience on Friday night.

## OPENING THE CAMPAIGN.

An esteemed friend in Onslow who digs his taxes out of the ground, writes inviting us to the county for a speech at the next spring term of Onslow Superior Court. **Gen. STRAIN.—We had the pleasure of a visit from our friend General Strain, who is President of the Wilmington and Tarboro Railroad. The grading of this road began the first day of June last, and is now completed except about two miles. The iron for the whole track, from England, is lying at Tarboro awaiting transportation. This speaks well for Gen. Strain and Gen. Lewis, the Superintendent of the road. This road was built by means of State bonds dispersed off before Littlefield began to manipulate them.**

**Honest State.—We learn from the Observer that a negro named John Frank Williams, was shot by policeman Wm. Taylor, while attempting to burglarize the store of M. W. Alexander, in Charlotte, on Monday night. The shot took effect in the back, and was pronounced by the surgeon, Dr. McCombe, to be fatal. The negro said he was trying to get into the store to get some money he knew to be in the money drawer.**

**SANDWICH ISLAND SUGAR.—American planters are largely engaged in sugar culture in the Sandwich Islands, and the profits yield thus far gives encouraging prospects. Up to October 13, the sugar exported since January 1st amounted to over one thousand six hundred and eighty tons, and for molasses even hundred and thirty tons, making a weekly average export of one ton; making a weekly average export of produce from the plantations of two hundred and ten tons of sugar and twenty tons of molasses, or a total average for thirty-seven weeks of two hundred and thirty tons. Fifteen millions five hundred and sixty-one thousand pounds of sugar and two hundred thousand gallons of molasses for the period named is no trifling business, and must be taken into account in calculating the supply needed for consumption on the west coast and in Utah, where upwards of 250,000 pounds have been sent within a few weeks. According to the Honolulu "Advertiser" the crop of sugar for 1862 will reach fully 200,000,000 pounds, and that for 1870 will amount to 200,000,000 pounds. The Hawaiian Government have an emigrant agent in Yokohama, Japan, for the sugar plantations, and a considerable number have been sent out, but thus far the supply is inadequate on account of unfavorable reports in Japan respecting the hardships of the service.**

**THE SUZ CANAL.—THE OPENING CEREMONIES.**

All our latest news, to the effect that the Suz Canal is a great success. In spite of all that has been said to the contrary, the world is now convinced that the waters of the Red Sea have been brought together, and few are disposed to doubt that navigation, even on the part of ships of heavy cargo, is now more than possible. The Empress Eugenie and the emperors of all lands that could be crowded into forty vessels have in sight and a half hours passed safely and successfully through the first half of the canal and reached the grand central deposit which is in full time to come bear the Vicinity name. Immensely now commanded attention, quite equal to Port Said, and we are no longer permitted to doubt that the fiery vessels, and others besides, will without much difficulty make their way to the Gulf of Suz.

Meanwhile the festivity continues. It will be grander than Port Said. This will be grander than Ismailia. All these grandiosities are such that the Arabian Nights' entertainments will be not only eclipsed, but made forever baneful and unmeasurable. For a few hours more we expect to learn that the voyage had been successfully accomplished, and that the dream of the Pharaohs, the Polybius of the Alexander, the Caesar, has become a fact. We wait with hope and confidence.
