All the while the expenses are accumulating—witnesses and jurors are not paid, and there are no legal fees when they ever will be. These are enormous and still not enough to meet the expenses of the county. O the beauties of the new judicial Constitution! O the glories of Radical administration! The more they help us, the worse are we are. State bankrupt, county bankrupt—ever high and debt increasing, and with repeated losses, the dockets growing! No we go.

CHATHAM EDUCATIONAL ASSOCIATION.

HATWOOD, Chatham Co., Jan. 13, 1870.
Pursuant to the call of the Executive Committee, the Association convened at 11 A. M. in the Presbyterian Church, and was called to order by the President.

Prayer was offered by Rev. B. B. Scott, looking divine, closing up the labor of the Association, and delivered an address, fitting forth in a most favorable light, the results accomplished by the Association, and the increasing interest everywhere manifested in its success. Upon motion, the address was referred to a committee of three, consisting of Rev. J. B. Martin, W. H. Merritt and J. H. Boone.
