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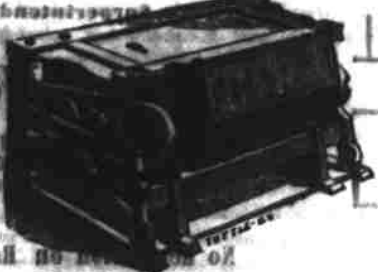

STILL ANOTHER ANECDOTE OF DANIEL WEBSTER.

A Boston correspondent assures *Harvard* that the following anecdote of the many funny anecdotes that Foran (N. H.) people tell of Mr. Webster, has not appeared in print:
During Mr. Webster's residence in that city in his younger days, there was a furniture dealer named Judkins, doing business in the town, who was a very well informed, as well as ambitious man. He was patronized by Mr. Webster, who often dropped into the shop to order or to inspect the making of some piece of furniture. These opportunities of conversing with a man so learned as Mr. W. were the delight of Mr. Judkins' list; and, on the 10th of the month of Boston, the payment of a considerable debt due Mr. J. was willingly left for future settlement. Attempts were made at various times to collect the debt—always in vain. Finally, Mr. Judkins determined to go to Boston and see Mr. Webster himself. He reached the city after a long and fatiguing ride, and, making a Sunday sojourn, proceeded to the residence of the creditor of high and towering stature. "Is Mr. Webster in?" asked he of the servant who answered the bell. "Yes, but he cannot possibly be seen." "But I must see him." "No; he is entertaining some Washington gentlemen—these are his dining." Mr. Judkins heard of subtleties and belated, not the serving man. "Well, I will come in and wait till he comes over," he persisted. The servant, seeing the man's determination, called the impatient stranger's name to his master. Fancy the surprise of Mr. Judkins at seeing Mr. Webster rushing up stairs and insisting upon the man's joining his friends at the dinner table! He would take no denial, and carried him forcibly almost, introducing him as "my old and dear friend, Mr. Judkins, of Portsmouth," and seating him between a distinguished Bostonian and the Secretary of the Navy; and, to use the words of the monthly cabinet maker, "I was for four mortal hours just as good as my body; my mortal was added on a good many occasions, and they all seemed to visit them, and to go to Washington, and everybody asked me to drink wine with them; and, by George, I made up my mind never to ask for my bill again. I was a poor man, and needed my money, but I had been treated as I never expected to be treated in this world, and I was willing to pay for it."

THE MARCHES OF CHRISTIANITY IN CHINA.—The American Press Association despatches give the following additional details of the marches of Christians in China. This gives the particulars of a fearful butchery of the French residents in that city by a mob of Chinese. Upon the 21st June an organized mob, imbued with an ignorant hatred of foreigners, and especially of French residents there, appeared in large numbers in the quarter populated by the latter and immediately commenced beating and maltreating every Frenchman whom they encountered. They first commenced with a Chinese man, a Frenchman, with a large Chinese, and cured all manner of weapons and began a dreadful massacre of the French. They entered the houses and sacked many of them, maltreating the inmates and dragging them into the streets where they were beaten with staves and bludgeons, and stabbed with knives. Many were killed or will die from the injuries inflicted. Some of the Chinese used fire arms.

The residence of the French Consul was broken into by a party, and himself and the Secretary of the French Legation were brutally murdered. The bodies were thrown into the sea. The French Consul was also killed. The French people overtaken were killed or stockily murdered. In fact the rage of the Chinese appeared to be unquenchable. Upon the 21st of June a party of Frenchmen, with their families, were taken to the French Catholic Cathedral, and drove into the workshop and work-pens, and when working at desks, in causing the total destruction.

ALL OUR MARCHES, said Uppala, in Sweden, there is a curious and renowned old MS. commonly known as the Silver Handwriting. It is a translation of the Bible into the original Gothic, and the best authorities claim that it was written toward the end of the 8th or the beginning of the 9th century. It was discovered in the 16th century, at Uppala, in the Rub, and its authenticity was at once established. It was taken to Prague, but the Swedes took it away in 1648, and carried it to Stockholm; thence it was taken to Holland, and was brought back again for Sweden by the Countess de Gards, in 1650. The MS. is a magnificent bound in solid silver, and is now preserved in the library of the University of Uppsala. It is written in silver, on parchment. The headings and a few principal passages are in gold. It is rich in Byzantine tracery of symbolic devices. It numbers 230 leaves, with twenty lines to each page. Only two punctuation marks are used throughout—the period and the colon.

The Western Unitarian Conference adopted strong resolutions against the recent official sanction given by the President, Vice President and Secretary of State to the forthcoming assembly of the Free Will Baptist Church in New York. They deplored such a sanction, because "it is popularly understood that one great purpose of such an assembly is to issue a sectarian confession of faith against Catholicism on the one hand and Free Will Christianity on the other." They characterize it as "a very dangerous precedent, and calculated to excite alarm in every free and unprejudiced mind, as looking to the official recognition of a special form of religion, if not a national church."

Claims to the property located at the corner of Broadway and Canal streets, New York, valued at \$9,500,000, have turned up in a Georgia village. They say one of their ancestors gave a lease on this land for one hundred years, which has just expired. The tenants on the property have no intention as yet of moving.
