GEN. LEACH
Gen. Leach spoke to a crowd of about
three hundred persons here on last Thurs-
day. His speech was a crushing reply to
the speeches made on the day before by
Gen. Scott and his body guard, and those
who heard the address of Leach were not
at all astonished that Phillips and Scott were
trying to worm through the campaign with-
out meeting Leach. It was a perfect
slaughter of the gentlemen.
He commenced by telling his audience
that he had on these different occasions
made propositions to Gen. Scott to make
arrangements for them to stump the dis-
trict together, but that Scott had made
various excuses for not doing so. He
read a letter from G. H. Scott, in which
he told of his own asking that some agree-
ment be made by which they could travel
together and discuss the issues before the
people. Scott in his letter, declined to en-
ter into any arrangement, saying that Mr.
Phillips had requested him to go up a
series of "Mass Meetings" in the district, and
that until after these meetings were over
he could not meet him. But, if he would
accept the address of Leach, he would
agree to a meeting. Leach said that as the
line was short he did not feel disposed to
sit down and wait until Scott got through
with his "Mass Meetings," but he made
his appointments, and would be happy to
divide time with Gen. Scott at any or all of
them.

Gen. Leach completely vindicated him-
self and party from every charge brought
by Scott and Phillips, and then he charged
logically and justly. He said that he had
received a communication from Gen. Scott
in which he was asked to make an agree-
ment that was so framed as to be
designed to prevent the election of the
Republican party.

It was a speech full of triumph, and an
encouragement to the Congress party.—
