R. C. RAILROAD.

We cannot be persuaded that the mere fact of a cash dividend having been declared and paid is sufficient evidence of the good management of the Road.

If the mere fact of a dividend of officials or parties, is to be taken, unopposed by facts, then the controversy must end.

We would call attention to the report of the Secretary of the Company dated 31st May, 1869, page 48, showing there was paid for new iron, chains and spikes \$118,553.

Showing that only \$25,983 in cash for new iron, chains and spikes, during the two years he has been in charge.

Again, the Secretary's report for the year ending 31st May, 1870, page 15, shows new iron, chains, purchased, to be \$23,420.

It has been the uniform estimate for the old iron taken up from the track to pay for one half of the new iron laid down.

But as fifteen years is regarded as a fair average for the life of iron on this Road, very little over one sixth of the quantity of iron necessary has been purchased.

On the first day of June, the annual meetings are held on the 2nd Thursday in July, when the changes in administration take place.

It will be seen at once from this that a President is not responsible for the pay rolls of June and July in his fiscal year.

This table shows that \$23,253 was the amount of the first payment made after we entered on our duties as President.

Take the other pay rolls in this table, for July 1867, through those we entered on the duties of office, the other pay rolls amount to \$17,180.

A gradual increase will be found after Smith's inauguration until April, 1869, when they amounted to \$11,261.

So that W. A. Smith has actually paid at the rate of \$14,170 more on pay rolls per annum than it would have had had no increase been made during his term.
