



THE CONSTITUTIONAL DISTRICT.

On Saturday the 11th last, you will be called upon to choose a delegate to the next Congress of the United States, to fill the vacancy created by the death of Hon. R. Gilliam.

As a constituent of the district from the several counties of the District, held at Franklin on Friday, the 11th inst., the Hon. John Manning, Jr., of Chatham was selected as the candidate of the Conservative Democratic party, to bear its banner in the present campaign.

As a result of the last general election, we are gratified to the Conservative principle of our State's freedom of liberty and peace, and the advocates of retrenchment, low taxes, and economy in the administration of public affairs.

The people of this 6th district have special cause for the choice of the Conservative candidate of their constituents for the election for the justly deserved rebuke which they visited upon those candidates who were the representatives and defenders of a State administration which had made itself an engine of oppression, tyranny and abuse of the people of the State—which outraged liberty by the arbitrary arrest of hundreds of our best and most respectable citizens, and decorated the name of Justice by converting them into instruments of punishment, through and by which partisan prejudice and personal malice could be inflicted upon an innocent people,—as expressed on the 4th day of August last, of the course of the Holden administration in making war upon the principles of the State, and denying them the benefit of the great writ of habeas corpus, which we have been taught to regard as sacred and inviolate, that Holden's administration, for weeks after the election, kept a standing army of hired soldiers at the State Capital and other points, at the expense of the poor loving citizens of our State, and continued to arrest, muffle, silence without authority of law or precedent.

The sons of the Holden administration were earnestly endorsed and supported by Mr. Joseph W. Holden, the present candidate of the Holden Republican party, and opponent of the Hon. John Manning, Jr.—Mr. Joe W. Holden has been put forward as a candidate for your suffrages as the representative of that party which has made war upon you, and in many ways known to you all, insulted and injured you.

Mr. Joe W. Holden was, while a member of the late Legislature, an earnest advocate of the infamous Shoffner Military Bill; vacating his seat as presiding officer of the House, taking the floor and making a long speech in its support—by authority of which Gov. Holden, in violation of the Constitution, placed two counties of our State under military law, thus invading the civil military power, placed a savage Tennessee outlaw with a band of hired ruffians over the peaceable and peace-loving citizens of Alamance and Caswell, to abuse and insult them, deprived many of our fellow-citizens of their liberty, cast them into vile dungeons, and hung them up by the neck to make them confess to that which they knew nothing of.

As member of the Legislature, Mr. Joe W. Holden was cognizant of, if not connected with, the corruption and swindling which characterised the actions of that body, by which millions of your bonds were expropriated and placed in the hands of notorious corrupt men for manipulation—all of which Mr. Holden has never condemned nor has he taken steps towards exposing the guilty and covering to his State the fair name and fame which she has ever borne.

Years ago, Judge Roads, then a Magistrate, issued a general warrant for leaving Court House, the warden was missing or the tower broken, the Turners had not come in Orange county, if he had applied to him first for a search warrant in those days he would very likely have denied to grant it for want of jurisdiction, but, as Judge, his jurisdiction is enlarged over what is written above. The Judge takes a narrow view of his powers indeed, if he thinks they are confined to the corporate limits of Mocking, and, of course to the more extended area of Shobering or Sutton, whose territorial divisions in the Judge's county.

A citizen of Carrollton or Cherokee has the same right to call on Judge Roads for a warrant, as a citizen of the Gap line.

Judge Roads' opinion has just reached us. It is much after the style of Judge Roads, but worse, for some and wildest "pig tight" Billy Cannon, on the same subject.

As to Cannon, it is said, that when he was elected he identified with the own in the mountains. An old man, with whom he is a good friend, says, "I tell you the whole world and the surrounding country, that the Turners are the same Gays line, including Mocking." And so say we.

THE GOVERNOR.
After Justice Ding and Justice Roads were applied to for a warrant to arrest Governor Holden. The sufficient affidavit that certain named negroes and whites, armed, and acting under the orders of one George W. Kirk and one W. W. Holden, had committed an assault and battery on Jas. Turner, Jr. do. do. Judge Roads made the following endorsement upon the affidavit:

"I am of the opinion that the application which does not justify the issuing of a search warrant; and if it were sufficient in other respects, no reason is given for passing over the local authorities.

If Judge Roads had wanted the law violated and a criminal arrested, he would have pointed out the defect in the affidavit.

Judge Roads knew that he was the greatest Judge to us, and only twenty-five miles distant. He was sorry that the Honor took such a disinterested view of his Judicial duty. He seems to forget that he is a Supreme Court Judge instead of a Magistrate of Mecklenburg Co.

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We note that Mr. Joseph W. Holden, who is a Whig for Congress, could not secure an amendment to his amendment to grant to us Negroes here in Orange County on hand "according to previous nation" but did not specify for want of an amendment. He would be getting no more than that. He further, however, will be responsible in Carrollton, for he had a crowd of 400, while he seems to be going "in" going by himself.

What has the party done so, that after advertising for a month or even longer, and standard bearer can't get a single man to hear him, as Holden is? is very little better. Turners' two constituents not finding the Bar or the other way out, and a few miles hence, are, what does "turner" do?

He is now on the road to meet me, calling the last 100 or 120 miles in the mountains. He will get at least one thousand miles before he gets to the Bar. At that, it is necessary for the Conservative, who has not heard Holden, to go to the Gap line, and there he will be responsible for his conduct.

Properties.
