**IMMENSE FREIGHT.**—The greater freight ever known there now prevails in Tar River. Great damage has been inflicted on the banks of the river and many bridges swept away.

**BRIDGE DAMAGED.**—The bridge on the Wilmington and Weldon Railroad, over the Tar river, near Rocky Mount, has been so injured by the late frosts as to necessitate the erection of a new structure. The train, however, connect by having engines and cars each side the river.

**ST. LOUIS ELECTION.**—The Democratic majorities in the St. Louis city election range from \$100 to \$300. The Democrats elect ten of the twelve aldermen, making the council a tie. The Democrats have carried the municipal elections generally throughout the State.

The grand reception will be held on Monday (to-night) night, when a most brilliant evening may be confidently looked for, and unlike anything ever before offered to the citizens of Raleigh.

**FOURTHER INCENDIARY.**—On Friday night last between 12 and 1 o'clock, the kitchen and contents of Henry Sennas, Battlesboro' district, Edgecombe county, were totally destroyed by fire.

About three o'clock the same morning, the barn of Dr. J. J. Phillips, some two miles distant, was also burned. Ned Taylor alias Ned Phillips, formerly a slave of Dr. Phillips, has been committed for trial.

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**CLERKS TO THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY.**—Clerks to legislative bodies, like soldiers, always do the work, while others get credit for what is done. We simply wish to hear testimony, to the efficiency of the gentlemen who occupy clerkships to our General Assembly, viz.: Miss Saunders and London of the Senate, Gaither and Craig of the House, Hardin, Mast and Wilson. These gentlemen can well enjoy the pleasure of "duty well performed." We wish them a most pleasant time during recess, and a return next fall fully prepared for the work which will be before them.

**BOMB BURGLARY.**—On Wednesday night, in this city, the room of Dr. Hardy, member of the House of Representatives from Greene county, at the residence of Rev. Harper Whitaker, was entered and his piano having some \$100 in the pockets, was abstracted therefrom. The room of Mr. Turner, a book agent, in the same house was also entered and a valuable silver watch unmercifully appropriated.

The robbery is supposed to have taken place about midnight, and up to the present no clue has been obtained which can lead to the detection of the guilty party or parties. We understand that Dr. Hardy had taken the precaution to place his piano under his pillow.

**THE ACT TO PROTECT THE CITY OF RALEIGH FROM FIRE.**—This law, which was recently enacted by the Legislature, authorizes the city to bond bonds to the amount of \$12,000 bearing interest at the rate of 8 per cent, and not to be sold at a discount greater than 15 per cent. The proceeds of the sale of such bonds are to be applied to the building of thirty or more chimneys. This act further provides that an annual tax shall be levied and collected to pay the interest on the bonds and to create a sinking fund sufficient to discharge the principal in twenty years, and that three trustees are to be elected by the Commissioners, each of whom must be the owner of at least \$2,000 worth of unincumbered real estate, for the purpose of managing and investing the proceeds of the tax collected for the creation of the aforesaid sinking fund. No member of the Board of Commissioners can be such trustee, and the whole master is to be submitted for ratification or rejection to the property holders of this city on the 1st Monday in May.

**THE CAPITOL.**—From the force of habit we sauntered back to the capitol yesterday. It presented quite contrast to its appearance only two days ago. It really looked as if Caldwell had gone to ground. The Supreme Court about his constitutional scruples, and Friday Jones gone to hold prayers and implore all the Gods of salvation to save Mars Ted, and to lead the interloping democratic legislators to see the error of their way and not remove Mars Dave's trusty servant from the guardianship of the State valuable. Upon the whole, the capital presented a sad spectacle.

The House was as silent as if listening to the funeral sermon of Jaybird Jones, while Tar Hargrove was thinking of his "leadership," and prospective governorship. At 12 m. in pursuance of a resolution, both Houses adjourned sine die, to meet again next November. We bid them an affectionate adieu, adieu.
