PARIS, May 22.—The Daily News

Paris, May 19.—A London, midnight

report says that the Prussians are

preparing to make a grand attack on

Paris, to decide the future of the

Commune, and bring the present civil

struggle to a close.

Officers of the Commune have seized

the valuable and sacred articles of the

church of the Trinity, and all the

churches in the city will be similarly

dealt with and thus closed. The demolition

of the famous chapel of Expiation has

been commenced.

The court of impeachment was opened

to-day, to select hostages upon whom to

execute the retaliatory measures deter-

mined upon by the Commune.

The Communists were repulsed yester-

day in their attack at Neuilly,

Clichy, Ixey and Vanves.

THE ARREST OF BOCHOTTE.

VERSAILLES, May 20.—Bochotte was
