JEALOUS AND FUDSON—LETTER FROM CHIEF JUSTICE CHASE TO HON. C. L. WALSHAM.

WASHINGTON, June 20.—A jealous colored woman poisoned a rival here to-day with something white on a lump of sugar. The victim of the poisoning is dead.
