For the Sentinel WESTERN NORTH CAROLINA AS A TOBACCO GROWING REGION.

Mours. Editors; Allow me to call the attention of your readers to western North Carolina as a tologo growing region; and Caronia as a tousco growing region; and superially the counties of McDowell and Buncombe. A few days ago, I visited the large tobacco plantation of Samuel C. Shelton & Co.; of Buncombe. You will remember that Mr. Shelton took the ium on tobacco at the last annual fair at Raleigh, and also read before the agrioftural society as "essay" of great inter-oft in regard to the culture of tobacco. Mr. Shelton is a Virginian, and has a long experience in the raising of tobacco, who came to North Carolina about two years ago, and started the raising of tobacco in Huncombe county, on a large scale. He now has in cultivation about 650,000 dants, and working about forty-five hands. He tells me that tobacco farmers estimate their crops by the number of plants, rather than by the number of scres. But I will say that he has in cultivation about 150 acres, and I have never seen a crop equal to it. - he estimates that he can " to most the entire crop by the 10th of July at from 10 to 12 leaves. His farm is situated on the French Broad River, seven miles west of Asheville. He planted a portion of the crop as early as the 4th day of May; and Mr. Shelton, who came from one of the best tobacco regions in Virginia, says that large portions of this county is the best tobucco region he ever saw. The example of Mr. Shelton has inspired many thers with the determination to raise bacco. Gen. R. B. Vance has in cultivation about forty acres of tobacco, with the most flattering prospects of a magnificent crop; and it is estimated that 500 acres have been planted this year in the souty of Buncombe. And McDowell county is considered sup

ser to Runcombe for the raising of tobac o, on account of the seuson being a little onger, and the crop less subject to frost Before the war, several gentlemen in Mc Dowell had made a profitable business in the untrivation of tobacco; and Col. Neil had a manufactory for tobacco in Marion. The attention of the people, of this county, is again being aroused to this paying business of raising tobacco. Mr. Samuel H. Flemming and Mr. Orlando E. Malone, both, have beautiful crops of tobacco in McDowell county, and they and others de making arrangements to engage large y in the business next year. And it is itemplated very soon to start a tobacco

anufactury in Marion.

That, as the people are the source of all power in our form of government, and as the government itself emphatically theirs, it was commendable and wise in the legislature to leave the question of calling a convention to the people, instead of ordering one them 2. That we approve the restrictions con

tained in the convention bill, believing that the luborer's lies law is just and equitable; that the colored man's rights should not be interfered with, if they could be, and that the homestead question, having been adjudicated and settled, should remain undisturbed.

 That the question of changing our organic law rises far above all mere party questions, affecting, as it does, the interests the whole people of all portions, and the movement for a convention should, therefore, enlist in its favor the carnest and united efforts of men of all parties, and without respect to party.

 That our present state constitution is lefestive in many important particulars; and a convention is the best and cheapest if not the only practicable mode of feeting the necessary changes. We need a state convention to strike out those clauses of the constitution by which men hold over beyond the time for which the people elected them, and by which others threaten to do so; to abolish numerous uscless offices with their high pay; to re-move that great nuisance, the township move that great nuisance, the township system; to reform our judiciary, which was once our pride, but has become ex-pensive and inefficient, and diagraceful to our state; to give us a simpler and cheaper and better county government; to relieve us from a talerable burdens of taxation which three on to impoverish us, overp away our homesteads and crush us to the dust; in short, to restore to us once more a North Carolina constitution and system of government, simple, cheap and sound, of which we may be proud, and under which we may all live in peace and
