and parallel Smoky Mountain chain were pushed up by volcanic forces, such for exmple as the expansion of internal heat of the enveloping crust, then there must have been two parallel axial lines of force, and we would naturally expect to find granite brought to the surface and exposed upon the summit of the Smoky as well as on the Ridge. This theory would indve endless complications, for there must have existed a system of cross forces erresponding to the transverse mountain chains with intervening valleys extend-ing from one to the other of these great axial lines. This, it seems to me exposure of the primordial rocks along the crests of these cross chains, many of which are equal in elevation to the main elevais a fact fatal to this theory, that the respective inverted beds, in the principal features of their strike and in lination, have been disturbed very little f at alf, by these transverse chains. In deed, the gneiss, mica slates, hornblend cross mountains and valleys at nearly right angles, with strike and dip corresponding to the great axial line of the Blue Ridge. So, also, the grits, chy siates and con-glomerates of the Smoky Mountain chain conform in strike and inclination to these older beds. The evidence in support of this theory of volcanc upheaval does not sufficiently agree with the facts as they are here developed. We must then look to some other source for the forces which have produced this great upheaval and super-position of the older upon the newer rocks.

It is a prevailing opinion amongst geologist that the center of our globe is s-mass of igneous matter, such as is emitted by active volcanoes. These volcanic vents in low the constant escapement of heat from the center of the globe. It is a fact gen-erally conceded that there is a general, as well as countant escapement of heat from this igneeus center through the crust of the earth. The crost as we see it here exposed bears an air of great antiquity, and hence it is reasonable to suppose that at the time when this great catastrophe and by these various agencies, no doubt, di nimished the volume at the center, or at initiated the volume at the center, or as least relaxed the tension upon the enveloping crust and created a vacuum.
