## GOV. CALDWELL.

Lieut Phillips and Pool, Gov. Caldwell would fain make men believe, but for a "technically," as speaking John said, he could take the last oath. The governor made stirring speeches in Burke urging his neighbor's children to the fight. When they went out to settle the fire made them a visit and urged them to defend or die under the "Bonnie Blue Flag that bears a single star." When they fell, he said, he and the old men would take their places. He did not keep his word, but he sent the soldiers' shoes, clothes, and food. These are the "technicities" which kept the three Phillips, Pool, and Caldwell, from taking the test oath, swearing they never "gave aid or countenance or encouragement to the rebellion."

After the war, in which his son was killed, Gov. Caldwell attempted to carry the odium which attached to his war record in the estimation of negroes, carpet-baggers, and federal soldiers who camped about his home. In a public discussion he said he did make a speech at a certain locality in Burke, but it was to make the d—m negro volunteers that they might be killed. There were only some half dozen secessionists or democrats in that whole neighborhood, as was proven and can be proven again to-day.

Gov. Caldwell was about to be conscripted and Gov. Vance gave him an easy place. When the war was closed, and Gov. Vance was a prisoner, Gov. Caldwell said, "I'll go him, he (Caldwell) would like to go to his hanging. These things we told us by gentlemen whose word will not be questioned."

The following resolutions were offered by Gov. Caldwell, at a railroad meeting in 1863. They show what war, as well as of what mean mettle this man is made. Then he was willing to sacrifice his son and every employee on the railroad to prosecute the war. Now he is willing to go to the hanging of Vance, Davis, and every man who was zealous in its prosecution. But to the resolutions:

A meeting of the stockholders of the Western N. C. railroad company, held in Saltbury, Nov. 11, 1863, the following preamble and resolution was offered by T. R. Caldwell, Esq.:

Who's in the country is now engaged in a pernicious war, in which she needs the services of all the able-bodied citizens within the exception of age; and whereas, we have an abundance of intelligent, experienced and practical business men among us, who were made able and efficient officers in the New N. C. Railroad Company. Be it therefore—

Besides, by the stockholders of said company in annual meeting assembled that no person ought to be appointed director, engineer, superintendent, conductor, or to any office or post in said company unless he was a non-conscript, discharged soldier, or exempt from this service on account of bodily infirmity and has been so declared by a board of examining surgeons.

After considerable discussion, participated in by M. S. Caldwell, Kerr, and W. W. Avery, the resolution was amended by W. W. Avery, which amendment was accepted by T. R. Caldwell, as follows:

**Resolved further,** That no person who is a subscriber to the Raleigh Standard or State Journal be employed in any capacity on said lines.

A New York newspaper, commenting upon the assumed vindication of the conduct of Philip H. Sheridan by the failure of the grand jury to indict him—or even the instrument through whom, Colonel Groveson was murdered,—recalls the circumstances that several grand juries in New York city have failed to indicted Tweed, Connelly & Co., and pertinently asks whether Tweed, Connelly & Co., are also vindicated by this process? The question is a suggestive one for those ignorant or bigoted persons who suppose that the action of a grand jury is infallible and final, as regards all law and above and below the earth.

The grand jury of Wake have known a corrupt republican legislature to receive \$240,000 in the way of bribes for putting a debt of \$25,000,000 upon the people of the state. Kim Lee has \$10,000 and Judge Watts \$2,000 of this money.

When Littlefield was presented for complicity in these frauds, Judge Watts adjourned the court immediately.

When we informed Mr. Peterson Dunn, foreman of the grand jury, where he could find evidence of Gen. Littlefield's bribing Gen. Ladd, a member from Pitt, Judge Watts called up the grand jury and charged them that they had been tampered with and no one but the solicitor and sworn witness must speak to the grand jury. This was as vain and wicked as Phillips, who, with Carrow, had a magistrate arrested because he had put no seal to his warrant in a criminal case, where there was no law requiring a seal. Samuel P. Phillips should henceforth be called Seal-and-Seal Phillips.

**UNITED STATES CIRCUIT COURT—NOVEMBER TERM, 1871—FIRST DAY.**—Court met at 11 o'clock, Judge Brooks presiding. We understand that Judge Bond will not be present, he being engaged in South Carolina. The drawing of the grand jury was deferred until to-morrow, and after the names of the jury were called, the jurors were dismissed until to-morrow at 10 o'clock. The docket was proceeded with and several cases were called, in which no action was taken. The kluxus cases were continued until next term, and the clerk was directed to renew the recognizances in the cause in which the defendant was now bailed. This order was made with a proviso that it redistrict was desired, the master should come before the court. A number of parties renewed their bail. The case of the United States vs. James H. Hargrove was set for hearing to-morrow. District Attorney for prosecution, and McCorkle for the defense.

The Sheriff of Granford, R. M. Stafford, yesterday paid into the Treasury \$8,200, and the Sheriff of Hyde, H. S. Gibbs, deposited \$2,000.

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
