THAT ROMAN.—In our last we spoke of a strange man in connection with The Sentinel's office. The racing is still afoot. It is reported on the streets that glazing and glass cracks occur in the printed testimony taken before the grand committee.

It is reported that there is an apparent effort to seize Swanson and implicate others. For instance, Swanson's profits in Florida are said to have been changed in the printing from \$10,000,000 two hundred thousand to two hundred thousand dollars, and Gen. THE LEGISLATURE.
The only bill of any general importance which came up yesterday in the House was the bill appropriating representation in the House of Representatives which passed its second reading and was postponed until today (Monday). The day was taken up in the passage of private bills.

In the Senate, the bill to provide for representation in the Senate was reported and ordered to be printed. The bill will be found reported in full in the Senate proceedings.

Saturday, in the Senate, was given up to the consideration of private bills, solely, the special orders for that day, public measures being postponed until Monday. The Senate worked diligently and carefully in the consideration of those measures, and between thirty and forty bills were disposed of—an unprecedented day's work. Heck \$15,000; and other sums, amounting, all told, to \$85,713.41!!"
