TO RESTORE CHARRIED MANUSCRIPTS.—The restoration of the writing on manu-scripts charred by fire, may, it is said, be accomplished by separating the charred paper into single leaves, immersing them in a solution of nitrate of silver (forty grains to the ounce of water). The opera-tion is to be conducted in a dark room, and when the writing is sufficiently legible, the excess of silver solution should be washed out with distilled water and a diluted solution of hyposulphite of soda.

A NEW DISTRIC COURT.—Congress has passed the bill dividing this State into two Judicial Districts, and Judge R. P. Dick, of the State Supreme Court, has been appointed Judge. Carrow still re-mains Marshal of the whole State. Mr. Poole failed to make the trial in getting appointed Marshal of the new District. ATTEMPT AT BURGLARY.—An unknown party on Sunday night attempted to enter the residence of Mr. R. W. Bryan, in the eastern ward, by raising one of the lower windows. Fortunately, Mr. Bryan, who visiting the house of a relative across the street, discovered the rascal and immediately gave chase. The fellow made good his escape through the garden after the ground. Mr. Bryan was about 60 years old and leaves several children. His sudden death, we learn, is attributed to his friends to disease of the heart.

ARREST OF A COUNTERFEITER.—On

Sunday morning one William Champion, a young man of about 25 years old, was brought to this city from Apex and lodged in jail on a charge of attempting to pass counterfeit money. We gather the following concerning the matter: Champion on Saturday about dark entered the store of H. C. Olive & Co., and presented what he represented to be a \$50 bill, saying that he wanted \$5 change out of it. Mr. Olive immediately discovered that the bill was a \$1 bill with a hunting attempt at an alteration to a \$50 bill. Champion was immediately arrested and carried before Justice A. B. Freeman, who committed the prisoner was lodged in jail in default of a \$1,000 bail bond. Champion had denied all intentional guilt in the matter and gave his name as N. I. Davis, but soon made a full confession and gave his true name.

UNITED STATES CIRCUIT COURT.—

This tribunal convened yesterday in Metropoliitan Hall at 12 M., Judge Brooks presiding. Judge Bond will not arrive before Monday.

A. Ashe, of this city, and Isaac Strayhorn, and T. M. Argus, of Orange, and J. M. Morris of Chatham, were admitted to practice in the court upon taking the usual oath.

Judge Brooks stated that since his arrival in this city, he had been informed that a law had nearly passed Congress providing for the establishment of Eastern and Western Circuits. The Western Circuit commencing at the Virginia line and embracing the counties of Chatham and Person and others, then running straight line to the South Carolina boundary line. He would, therefore, postpone the drawing of the jury for 24 hours that he might have an opportunity to post himself in regard to the law. The jury was accordingly discharged.
