The case of U. S. vs. W. H. Thompson et al. was transferred to the Western Circuit at Greensboro Term, 1st Monday in October.

The case of U. S. vs. Miles Moffit, Chatham county, charged with removing brandy from distillery before paying taxes, was next called up. District Attorney Starbuck appeared for the government and Battle & Sons for the defendant. The defendant's counsel made a motion to quash the indictment on the ground that the bill found by a grand jury of one term was amended by the grand jury of a subsequent term without passing upon the bill as amended. After argument by counsel, the Judge reserved his decision and the defendant went to trial on the plea of "not guilty."

After argument by the counsel and the charge of the Judge, the case was given to the jury who, after a short absence, returned a verdict of "not guilty."

The Court then adjourned to meet again at 3 p. m.

It was ordered that Peace Street be widened ten feet each way, and Mason, John Nichols, D. L. Royster, Hand, Lockhart, Colonel Shaffer and Thomas Jenkins were appointed to assess the damages according to law.

J. P. Adams was elected tax assessor, vice Col. Shaffer, resigned.

On motion of Dunston, col., a committee of three, consisting of Messrs. Churchill, Battle, Stronach, Gorham, Prairie, Upchurch, Ellison and Dunton, Commissioners.

Proceedings of the last meeting were read and adopted.

The committee appointed to rent out the west end of the Market basement room, submitted a verbal report.

On motion of Mr. Battle, the report was referred to the City Attorney for his opinion in regard to the transfer of the lease with the license for retailing liquor, and if the original lessee has the right to sublet the premises, &c.

On motion of Mr. Battle, it was ordered that the present street force be reduced to 25, who shall be selected from the indi- cious able bodied permanent citizens of Raleigh.

Mr. Battle also moved that all the new streets be opened as soon as practicable, even if work upon the streets should be suspended. Adopted.

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The Conservative will nominate candidates for the Legislature in due time.

Granville will keep up its reputation for fine tobacco. A few days ago E. F. Lyon sold in Richmond, Va., 5,000 lbs. averaging \$100 per hundred pounds. His highest brought \$102—his lugs \$22.50. E. F. Lyon averaged \$98 per hundred, paid him \$90 for his best and \$20 for his best. Robert Fleming averaged \$56, getting \$97 for his best and \$43.50 for his worst inferior. On motion of Mr. Gorman, it was ordered that one of Kitchens' North Carolina fire pumps be placed in the well at the corner of Exchange Place and Fayetteville street, in order that its merits may be tested.

The following ordinance was off-red by Mr. Battle and unanimously adopted:

Ordered, That any person shall wilfully or negligently, or by unreason able violence in using, injure any public well or pump of the city, shall be fined \$100 and imprisoned for six months.

It was ordered that the Street Commissioner cover up the well now open on a vacant lot in the western ward.

Osborne Hall was re-elected sexton for the city cemetery.

Henry Hunter, col., was elected sexton for the colored cemetery.

Nichols & Gorman were elected city printers.

On motion of Battle, the City Treasurer was authorized to borrow money at short time for the purpose of paying incidental expenses of the city, and pledge the first moneys received for taxes as security.
