QUARTERLY CONFERENCE.

On Monday night the quarterly conference of the M. E. Church, South, of this District, closed its session. The matter of the erection of a new church building in this city was the main topic discussed and the result of the deliberation was the appointment of a committee, consisting of Rev. A. W. Mangum, M. A. Hixson, Rev. W. J. W. Crowder, W. J. Young and J. A. Jones, to negotiate the purchase of a lot on the Exchange Hotel lot, Hillsboro' Street, on which to erect the building, and to solicit funds. The conference remained in session until a late hour, and we hope its legislation will be productive of great good to the interest of the Church.

ACQUITTALES.

On yesterday (Tuesday) morning at 2 o'clock, the jury returned a verdict of not guilty as to Norman Johnson and William Lawrence. The other defendants John H. Burt, N. G. Burns and J. W. Lashley, having been previously declared not guilty. The speeches of General Cox and Judge Fowie, counsel for the defence, on Monday afternoon, were able and eloquent efforts, and if ever a mortal received a tongue lashing Harry C. Lashley is the man. He was proven beyond a doubt to have perjured himself on several occasions and to be a man of infamous character and in other respects. Three of his (Lashley's) main witnesses were also proved to be men of vile character. Thus ends one of the most infamous and outrageous attempts on the part of certain Republicans in this county to persecute men for their political opinions. The city remains quiet and orderly. At the police court yesterday (Tuesday) morning the docket was clear of entries.

Commencement exercises at Wake Forest College begin to-day (Wednesday). A large crowd from this city will attend.

The question of a front entrance to the western basement of the market house is again being discussed.

It is estimated that there is at least 7812 aspirants to the vacancy on the bench of the Supreme Court. Ed. Cantwell is the half man.

During the storm Saturday night, the stable of Mr. Robert Adams, who resides 10 miles west of this city, was struck by lightning and a valuable horse killed.

Mr. Edward Hutchings, son of Col. C. W. D. Hutchings, is in the city. Mr. H. has been residing in Galveston, Texas, for the last two or three years.

At 7 o'clock yesterday (Tuesday) morning an excursion train from Fayetteville passed through this city en route for Norfolk. There was a large crowd of ladies and gentlemen aboard.

MAGISTRATES COURT.

On yesterday (Tuesday) J. F. Hopkins, charged with forcibly entering the premises of William Foster, colored, and taking off a jug of molasses therefrom, was heard before D. A. Wicker, J. P. The evidence did not sustain the charge and the case was dismissed at the cost of the plaintiff. All of the parties were from Little River Township.

EXAMINATION OF THE DEAF AND DUMB ASYLUM.—SECOND DAY.

Yesterday, according to previous arrangement, the deaf and dumb classes were examined and the result proved the thorough and careful training they have received during the past scholastic year. All of the officers and teachers of this institution are eminently fitted for their several positions, and the unfortunate inmates could not be placed in better hands. The administration of the present Board of Directors, while it enforces a prudent and sound economy, tends towards extending the usefulness of the institution, and to make it fully serve the noble end and purpose for which it was designed.

U. S. CIRCUIT COURT.

This Court met yesterday (Tuesday) at the usual hour. Judge Brooks presiding. Several important motions were made.

N. S. Simpkins, witness for the U. S. in the case of U. S. vs. Lucas Stallings, was recognized to appear at the next term of the Court in a bond of \$100.

The case of the U. S. vs. W. W. Woodell, charged with passing a \$2 counterfeit bill, was taken up. D. G. Fowie, T. C. Fuller and T. P. Devereux appeared for the defendant and the District Attorney prosecuted. The following jury was empanelled in the case: E. E. Harris, J. W. Blount, M. W. Churchill, John Flagg, J. W. Rogers, E. A. Whitaker, Allen Terrell, W. D. Haywood, Thomas Dabney, Martin Whitlock, Jos. C. Myatt and T. W. Sadler. At the hour of going to press the case was still progressing.

COCKY HORSES.

The handsome cock horse in the State is the one at Fayetteville. It is a much more elegant structure than the one was recently burnt at Greensboro'. It is of no regular style of architecture, but resembles the Homosajous more than any other. It is an airy, tasteful, substantial edifice, with the best corner room, by all comparison, we have ever seen.

Wake needs a more stately edifice. Why not sell out and build a new court house at a more eligible point? It ought not to be immediately on Main Street, but in a grove in some retired part of the city. We ought to have a court house large enough to seat three hundred persons at least. Wake has over 7,000 voters you must remember.

FEDERAL COURT.

The Court convened at 10 o'clock.

Solicitor Starbuck stated there was a case against W. W. Woodell for passing counterfeit money. The defendant was in jail.

Mr. Fuller, who appeared for Josiah Turner, Jr., stated that the case of Turner was set for Friday last. That it was understood that his case would be called after the one just disposed of. The District Attorney stated that Mr. Phillips was the leading counsel in this case, and was engaged in the Supreme Court. Mr. Fuller said he would extend any courtesy to counsel, but his client was anxious for trial. Witnesses from Moore and Harnett were in attendance; they left home two weeks ago leaving their harvest ripe for the sickle. These witnesses were anxious to be off for home on the train at 3 o'clock. A note was received from Mr. Phillips stating that he would be present in an hour or so. Mr. Phillips appeared about 11 1/2 o'clock. Mr. Fuller called attention of the court to the presence of Mr. Phillips, and asked that the case of Turner be called. District Attorney called Wm. E. Pearce, John Maddox, and Capt. J. Q. DeCarter, none of whom answered. He stated the government could not go to trial and asked a continuance.

Mr. Fuller said his client had been active in procuring the appearance of prosecutor's witnesses. He had seen Capt. DeCarter who, though greatly afflicted, would come into Court when set for. His client had sent a messenger for Capt. Pearce, who after a ride of 22 miles had just returned and reported Capt. Pearce as on his way to Court. As to John Maddox, he had been examined before Commissioner Shaffer, Mr. Phillips and Solicitor Starbuck, and a valuable horse killed.
