ANOTHER STIRRING OF THE CROSS POOL.

—BOLLY BOY-LEGS FROM SALISBURY NOTED.—Tuesday evening the Granite assembled in Metropolitan Hall. Fifteen white and about 250 negro republican put in an appearance. A parietic printer by the name of M. V. B. Gilbert called the concern to order, and nominated Joseph—the inevitable Joseph—the mail agent Joseph—to the chair. Joseph seemed to be laboring under some great excitement. His nasal chord deserted him and his English was badly broken—indeed it was completely smashed—it was a sort of a cross between low Dutch and very high English, or very low English and high Dutch. He commenced thus: "As near as the reporter could follow:

YELLOW ABITUZES.—I DANK YOU.

You know you will always find me vate I aint and if I aint there you will find me somevare else. Ever since I come amongst you sinitz, I ish been for de drug ting and mine self. Ish dis so velvet sinitz! (Loud cries of yes, yes.) I go mit you now (tremendous applause and cheers for Joseph.) Ven I go mit mit you you go not along mit me (more applause). Times ish not as dey used to vas. Places vot knowed me den know me no longer, and de place vot know me now vill, hope, know me forever. Vot you say, Griz, now clected, shure sure de sun, sweet comben of liberty, vill rise to set no more, shure so sure Grant clected. (The applause was so enthusiastic that the eminent orator repeated the beautiful figure of speech until his audience memorized it and then they ceased to applaud.) Monsieur, Signior, Mynoher or Herr Joseph continued in this strain of logical argument and fervid eloquence for some time. The reporter will attempt no further report of this, the greatest effort of this distinguished gentleman's life, as he despairs of doing it full justice.

WHEN THE CHAIRMAN WAS ABOUT TO CONCLUDE.

Slimy Funk Phillips appeared marching down the aisle whereupon the negroes set up a squall for him. He took his stand in front of the stage and announced that a "distinguished gentleman and a good republican from a distance" was present and would address them.—William Bow-legs Bailey, of Salisbury. The accomplished chairman introduced him as "Shudge Bailey." (Joseph is shrewd; he knows that Bailey expects to be paid for his adhesion to the radical party by being appointed to fill the vacancy on the State Supreme Court.)

THE SPEECH OF THIS SELFING, DRIVER.

was a close imitation of the dirty and incendiary harangues of Tod Caldwell. He endorsed the suspension of the writ of Habeas Corpus and alluded to the Sheriff act as a righteous one. Those sitting near the speaker had to move their seats when he proceeded from a decayed tooth, which by the way is the "last of the Mohicans," but which was mingled with the perfume of onions, was not agreeable to the olfactory nerves.

S. F. FOLLOWED BAILEY AND MUCH IN THE SAME STYLE.

The negro, James Harris, followed S. F. and during his remarks a very disgraceful scene ensued. Harris during his remarks stated that he would reply to any interregories propounded to him. A colored liberal republican, from Washington City, stood up in a very respectful manner to intimate his desire to accept the speaker's invitation. Immediately he was visited with the wrath of the negroes. Shouts of "Sit down you damn nigger!" "God damn you sit down!" "You shan't open your mouth" and the like. Harris then exclaimed, in substance, "all colored men like you come down here ought to have a collar around your necks." The demonstrations of the negroes became so threatening that Deputy Sheriff Hagrini interfered and led the man from the Hall, whose only offense was the willingness which he exhibited to accept a public invitation, extended by a speaker, to ask questions. The man's manner was perfectly respectful, and when told to take his seat quietly did so without uttering a word. A meeting of Hotentots would have behaved more decently.

OUTRAGE UPON A COLORED CITIZEN.—

A GREELEY AND BROWN REPUBLICAN SET UPON BY A CROWD OF NEGROES—HE SNEERS THE PROTECTION OF THE POLICE AND HAD TO BE PLACED IN THE GUARD HOUSE TO SHIELD HIM FROM DAMNED, &c.—On Tuesday evening, during the march of the impromptu torchlight procession on Fayetteville Street, near Tucker Hall, S. G. Cross, one of the marshals, during the day at the Greeley and Brown mass meeting, was surrounded by a yelling crowd of negroes, uttering the most abusive epithets and threatening every moment to lay violent hands upon him. Cross, seeing that he was in real danger of being murdered or being severely beaten, turned away to go down the street, upon which the negroes made a rush upon him. Cross was compelled to seek safety in actual flight. The pursuers pursued their intended victim so closely that he was forced to take shelter in a store on Wilmington street. A policeman coming up at this moment, Cross demanded his protection, and the officer, seeing that he could not single-handedly restrain the rioting crowd, drunk with the vile passion, stirred up in their bosoms by the incendiary appeals and harangues of their leaders, procured assistance and removed Cross to the Guard House where he was kept until Mayor Whitaker came. The crowd then dispersed after indulging in more elegant phrases, and loudly declaring that they would make this place too hot for "dama democratic and liberal republican negroes."

IT WILL NOT BE ANIMUS TO STATE HERE

that Simon Craven, col., a member of the State Liberal Republican Executive Committee, was visited at his home on yesterday morning by a couple of negro men, in the presence of his wife and children, in a most insolent manner. He was told that if he dared to come out of his house they would break every bone in his body.

LET IT BE REMEMBERED THAT THESE TWO

unwandering citizens were thus outraged simply and solely on account of their opposition to Grant, and this is a specimen of the system of attempted intimidation practiced every day throughout the State. There is a large number of colored men whose intelligence would lead them to range themselves under the Greeley banner but they are deterred from doing so by the fear of actual and personal violence at the hands of their own race. And their white leaders are in a great measure responsible for this. As soon as a colored man declares his opposition to the party in power they (the leaders) begin at once to excite, in every conceivable way, the animosity of his colored brethren against him, and soon it becomes dangerous for him to mingle freely with the people of his own color. They do this in order to prevent others from voting and speaking as they please. Thus are the laws of Congress in regard to intimidation enforced. These are specimens of the law and order which Grant's "let us have peace" policy incites in the southern States.

MARKETS.

FROM NEW YORK.

New York, July 16.—Tweed's trial commenced in the Supreme Court. The defendants' counsel are Messrs. David Dudley Field, Bartlett, Stoughton, Burrill, Reynolds, Hartley, John Abraham and T. C. Smith. The prosecution are Messrs. O'Connor, Tilden and Lockham. A motion was made by the defense that the court venter judgment for a nominal sum, under which case it could be taken to the Court of Appeals.

O'Connor pressed the motion, believing it his duty to press the case with a "listening to any proposition from the defense. The defense claimed the right to be heard, whereupon the Court decided to hear the arguments in the Tweed and Connolly case together, and Stoughton made the opening speech for the defense. The Grand Jury have indicted R. L. Crawford, Vanderbilt's brother-in-law, of assault with intent to kill.

It is believed that Stokes will be re-fused bail. The next trial will probably be in Saratoga county.

A Long Branch letter says that a party of Misourians, whose name is not reported, called at the President's cottage yesterday.

Gen. Porter is shortly to make public a list of the Democrats who are going to stump for Grant, under the name of "The Herald's special from Boston intimates that General Banks has exposed Greeley.

The yacht Josephine captured in the gale yesterday evening off Heddes Island and sank. Her crew and passengers were rescued by a police boat.

A party of ladies and gentlemen while sailing at Coney Island yesterday were robbed of as many as twenty thousand dollars worth of jewelry, money and bonds.

FROM SAN FRANCISCO.

San Francisco, July 16.—Two Irishmen demanded work on a farm near Bautas, Alameda county, last night, and was told by the farmer he had a sufficient number of Chinamen engaged to harvest his crops. This morning they were caught firing the grain stacks and captured. The prisoners were tried by the neighboring farmers and hanged.

FROM NEW ORLEANS.

New Orleans, July 16.—Lieutenant Governor Pinchback, who heretofore has favored Grant, made a Greeley speech at a Republican meeting at St. James Parish.

FROM SARATOGA.

Saratoga, July 16.—The attendance upon the race to-day was large. The betting at the start was \$300 on Longfellow against \$350 on Bassett. Bassett won by one length, time 2:39.

FROM BOSTON.

Boston, July 16.—Davis & Winder's paper mills at Pepperell has been burned. Loss \$50,000.

FROM KEY WEST.

Key West, July 16.—Advices from Havana state that Count Vandenbrouck embarked for Spain to-day. Immense course of citizens assembled at the Captain General's palace and upon the Caymans to bid him farewell. He is accompanied by Col. Ordiz and his personal staff.

THE SPANISH IRON CLAD NUMONICA

will shortly sail for New York on route to Spain.

The expedition which left here some days ago to search for hidden treasures on Dagura De Carter (Lionel) Alvaro District, returned unsuccessful.

General Lono, commander of Fort Cabana and Morio Castle, will shortly return to Spain.

Fort Monsero, at Neuville, was struck by lightning on the night of the 10th inst. A powder magazine exploded and seven artillerymen were killed. A rifle canon was carried a distance of 50 yards from its abutment.

The *Disera*, commenting upon the seizure of the steamer *Flores*, says that vessel was a pirate, and not a privateer, and that the commander of the *Mosses* decided her status when he captured her and carried her into Newport. Had she been a privateer he would not have taken her because a privateer's vessel is well recognized to a nation recognized as belligerent.

FROM CANADA.

LONDON, ONTARIO CANADA, July 16.—The case of Dr. Rufus Britton, abducted from Canada on the 4th of June, and taken to South Carolina, came up on a retrial to-day. Britton arrived here Saturday, but was kept concealed until after the opening of court, when he made his appearance to the great surprise of the defendants. His testimony shows that the Cornwell prisoners laid violent hands upon him at Watson, Ely, &c., and handcuffed him, with the assistance of the cab driver, and thrust him into the cage. That he protested to the last, and only yielded because he relied on the British Justice to sustain him in the end.—The case has been further remanded.

FROM CANADA.

LONDON, ONTARIO CANADA, July 16.—The case of Dr. Rufus Britton, abducted from Canada on the 4th of June, and taken to South Carolina, came up on a retrial to-day. Britton arrived here Saturday, but was kept concealed until after the opening of court, when he made his appearance to the great surprise of the defendants. His testimony shows that the Cornwell prisoners laid violent hands upon him at Watson, Ely, &c., and handcuffed him, with the assistance of the cab driver, and thrust him into the cage. That he protested to the last, and only yielded because he relied on the British Justice to sustain him in the end.—The case has been further remanded.
