NORTH CAROLINA.

BUCKEYEBURG COUNTY.—A very large amount of trade comes to this place from Franklin county, and we were told by the railroad agent that the shipments from this depot are much larger than any on the entire road from Lynchburg to Bristol. In order to accommodate the immense amount of produce brought to this depot, Gen. Mathews has commenced the erection of a very large depot building—the largest, perhaps, on the road. A number of houses are now working upon it, and it will be completed in a very short time.—*Buckeyeburg Times*.

POLITICS IN VIRGINIA.—The Conservatives have thus far made the following nominations for Congress:—First (Fincastle) district, E. M. Braxton; third (Richmond city) district, George D. Dixie; fifth (Danville) district, A. M. Dixie; sixth (Lynchburg) district, General Stephen Dodson; The second (Norfolk) and fourth (Petersburg) districts bearing large populations, it is likely that the Conservatives will make no nominations in them. The Convention in the seventh (Stratford) district will be held on the 1st of June, the contest being between Mowers-Duke and Harris, both of whom were in the last Congress, and were thrown into the same district by the last apportionment. The Radicals have made nominations as follows: First district, J. B. Scott; second district, James H. Plant; third district, John A. Smith; fourth district, Charles H. Porter and M. H. Stowell, both members of the present Congress, each claiming to be the true nominees; sixth district, R. W. Hughes. In several districts, where their party is in a hopeless minority, Radicals will support independent candidates should there be such, and make no nomination.—*Richmond Courier*.
