Items from *Wilmington Star*.

There was a row at a radical jollification on Monday at Albottford.

An old Carolina Female College at Ansonville, ten miles north of Wadesboro, has been re-purposed.

It was now stated that Gov. W. Price Jr., had never been removed from his position in the Custom House.

Two fine horses, belonging to Col. B. F. Little, of Richmond County, were killed by lightning on Thursday last.

Track laying, under the supervision of Capt. Wm. Smith, of this city, is to commence in Lumberville to-morrow.

Mr. E. S. Warick, of the Wadesboro "Argus," is very ill with typhoid pneumonia at the residence of his brother in this city.

A Bladen Court, now in session, true bills were found against Cebel Clifton, for the murder of his adopted son; and against John Clifton, his father, for being accessory before the fact. Young Clifton is at large.
