**FASHIONABLE.**  
The only shade of red now fashionably worn is the dull, dark shade called Russia leather leg.  
Dog collars of black velvet, that is, an inch wide band with a rosette in front and tied in a bow behind, are worn with lined collars by young ladies.  
Sailor suits of blue twilled flannel are worn by little girls on cool days. They have the blouse shirt such as boys wear, and a single shirt. White military braids is the trimming.  
The small novelties of the season begin to appear. New sets of collars and cuffs retain the standing English collar with points meeting and broken over at the throat, and also the flaring cuff, but are fastened by linen straps on which is a slide of jet or gold.  
The newest belt ribbons are black velvet (elastic velvets), fastened by large buckles of yellow gilt that look like Etruscan gold. Russia leather belts, both red and black, with gilt silver buckles, are much worn. An excess of the chateaine trickery already described is the caprice of the moment.  
There is a revived fancy for jet jewelry. It is brought out in some unique patterns; but the Marguerite design, though not new, seems to be most in favor. Jet of all kinds, whether for dress trimming or for jewelry, is in more massive and substantial shape than formerly.  
Fringed neckerchiefs of colored India silk are worn in the street with black coats. These were introduced some time ago, but have become popular with the first cool days, and are about to supersede black lace scarfs.

**ARREST OF A COIN COUNTERFEITER.**  
HED BROUGHT TO THE CITY AND IN PRISON.—Yesterday United States Deputy Marshal Boher brought to this city, from Greensboro', Oscar J. McFee, a celebrated coin counterfeiter. McFee was arrested in Salisbury on last Monday and taken to Greensboro', and on the same day was carried before Judge Dick who ordered his commitment in default of \$5,000 bail, but on account of the insecurity of the jail at that place was, on yesterday, brought for safe keeping to the jail in this city. Deputy Boher also found, in the woods near Concord, one hundred moulds which belonged to the gang, of which this McFee is the leading spirit. The moulds captured are designed for the manufacture of coin from the five cent nickel to 50 cents in silver, and from \$250 in gold to the \$20 piece. Some one hundred dollars of the forged coin already galvanized and \$150 ungalvanized was also captured by the officer making the arrest. This gang has been operating in a number of counties in the western portion of this State for the past 12 months, and the authorities have been put to much trouble to get upon their track. It is supposed that they have been in the habit of shipping their bogus coin to Texas to be put into circulation. McFee is a native of Canada but for a number of years resided in Texas.  
Deputy Boher worked up this case in a very skillful manner, and is confident of overthrowing the other members of the gang in a very short time.

I am glad to hear from "Raleigh" that "the fears of your correspondent are premature." These fears were aroused by the accounts in the city papers of the proceedings of the Board of Commissioners, in which the removal of the remains from the City Cemetery was discussed. We do not advocate intra-mural interment, nor the enlargement of the City Cemetery. There is a great deal of vacant space there now, especially in the northern part of it. What we plead for is that the bones of our good old citizens should be left undisturbed. Most persons, in fact, nearly all, will prefer the new cemetery, but why not let the old remain in all cities vacant spaces are left and this, with little attention, could be made an attractive spot. We can see nothing "diagnosed" about it; nothing to inspire "dismay." It is neglected, but whose fault? A visit to that sacred spot inspires, in most minds, feelings, tender, and mournful, a holy calm pervades the place, something of the presence of those good religious people seems yet to linger there. We long to emulate their virtues hoping in our turn to enjoy their calm and tranquil sleep. We have heard no one complain of "gaseous emanations" nor of "gurgling hydras" and cholera diarrhoea which the eloquent imagination of "Raleigh" conjures up. Like the man described by Moliere, we have endured all their horrors without knowing them! The exaggeration of such a vast number of bodies would certainly produce sickness. Their mouldering bones have offended no one; most of them have long since mingled with the dust. Peace to their sacred ashes! We wish no modern Hamlet to molarize over their skulls and fragments.
