PROM WASHINGTON.

Washington, September 30.—The act-ing Commissioner of Internal Revenue de cides that on and after Outober 1st, 1872, no stamps will be required upon checks, draits and orders, except such as are drawn at sight or on demand upon banks, bankers or Trust Companies He also de cides thaton and after that date no stamp are necessary upon foreign bills of (x-change. The acting Commissioner of Internal Revenue, in view of the ambiguity of a portion of section threes of the act of June 6th, 1872, imposing special taxes on dealers in malt liquors, and in view of the supposed intention of Congress, has decided that wholesale and retail liquor dealers may continue to sell malt liquors under their special tax receipts, as such, without being assessed as mait liquor dealers, and the collection of taxes assesses ed contrary to that construction shall be suspended until the question can be brought before Congress. Persons who sell only mait liquors are liable only to the special taxes of twenty or fifty dollars, as they are wholesale retail liquor dealers in mait liquors.

Ordinary stoicism gave way entirely, and they hugged and kneed each other and oried like children. Satanta made a speech in which he said that he felt like one risen from the dead. Hereferred to the talk he had with Governor Davis of Texas, who told him he must work hard for the p-see and influence of his people, If he did this he should be released.
