Burning out chimneys should be carefully and frequently attended to in rainy weather. Much fright and annoyance and real danger from their taking fire might be thus avoided. Much valuable property has been destroyed from negligence in this matter. Soot accumulates rapidly and a little care in this direction may save a deal of trouble, We clip the following from the Country Gentlemen :

If a chimney takes fire the readlest means to stop it, is to apply a wet table cloth, hearthing or blanket to the whole front of the grate or fireplace, and either old or pin it close into the jambs, ther ift up the bottom far enough to throw pall of water upon the fire; this will cro-ate a cloud of steam, which will reduce, if it does not extinguish the fire. If a pistol is fired up a chimney, it will bring down quantities of most, and it is an easy way to clease a small chimney. A few hand-fuls of sait thrown into the fire place of the grate, will put out the fire. Flour or sulphur thrown upon the fire will also paralyze the flame
