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### MISCELLANEOUS.

**FROM MASSACHUSETTS.**  
Boston, Dec. 19.—The House Representative to-day, by a vote of 104 to 79, passed resolutions condemnatory of the conduct of Senator Sumner in introducing a bill into the United States Senate to remove all inscriptions relating to the rebellion from the army register and National regimental flags.  
The Senate passed the resolution by a vote of 20 to 7.

**FROM EUROPE.**  
Madrid, Dec. 19.—The Superior says the reconstruction of the cabinet can't be longer delayed. The negotiations in the Cortes have resolved to support the vote of confidence only on condition that the government declare unequivocally in favor of the immediate abolition of slavery in the Spanish dominions.  
London, Dec. 19.—The ship 'Marchioness' has been wrecked off the coast of Northumberland. All lost.  
Robert Davies, a Paris banker, secured \$20,000 bail, and was released from Newgate.

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
