VIRGINIA.

The Rev. Dr. Munsey delivered a lecture in Bristol-Goodson, on "The Ideal Arts Fair" last week.

Col. John S. Barbour is laying out a new town at Arrington depot, on the Orange and Alexandria railroad.

General Early is to deliver several addresses in aid of the Lee Memorial in Lexington, and a move is on foot to secure one of these addresses at Staunton.

A shooting affray occurred last week at Stanton, between J. L. Bryan and N. B. Dickerson. The shot from Bryan's pistol struck Dickerson in the forehead, but gashed, not inflicting any injury.

COTTON RECEIPTS AT PETERSBURG.—The total receipts of cotton at Petersburg from September 1st, to Dec. 27, are 27,762 bales, against 18,502 for the corresponding period last year—increase of 9,260 bales.

MONSTER HOG.—Mr. Jacob Shaner had an exhibition at the Lynchburg, Va., market, on the 29th ult., a slaughtered hog weighing seven hundred and thirty pounds, only eighteen months old. This hog was raised by Mr. Stephen Ferguson of Campbell county, Va.

Several of the immigrants, who arrived at Norfolk, Thursday on the steamer Hibernia, of the Alien Line, passed through Lynchburg, Va., going West on the Atlantic, Mississippi & Ohio Railroad. They had a rough time coming over, being delayed a week at sea by tempestuous weather. They were a substantial set of Englishmen, and will distribute themselves over various parts of Virginia and Tennessee.

THREATENED SUIT.—Messrs. M. & E. Myers & Co., distillers of Petersburg, formerly of Salisbury in this State, have served legal notice on the city authorities that they will hold the city responsible for all loss incurred by them while the water supply is cut off. The expenses of Messrs. Myers, whether they are at work or not, amount to some seven hundred dollars daily, and as the scarcity of water is believed to be due to official incompetency they will hold the city responsible for their loss.

THE GUBERNATORIAL RACE IN VIRGINIA.—Mr. Edgar Snowden, Jr., writes from Richmond to the Alexandria Gazette:

"A movement is said to be on foot to bring out Judge Wm. J. Robertson, of Charlottesville, as the Conservative candidate for Governor of Virginia, with Gen. James A. Walker, of Palatka, for Lieutenant-Governor. Judge Robertson was for some years upon the bench of the Court of Appeals, and stands deservedly high as a lawyer and high-toned gentleman. General Walker commanded the Stonewall brigade in the Confederate army, and is a member of the present House of Delegates."

Sen. Sherman has presented a bill to make intoxication and the sale of liquor offenses against the Federal Government, and every provision in it so flagrantly oversteps all constitutional limits of the Federal power, that the bill may be taken as a burlesque of the present tendency towards centralization. It seems, however, to be seriously offered, and is probably intended to catch some favor from those who think the moral character of an object excuses any usurpation in effecting it. The Philadelphia Age suggests that an amendment limiting such an act to the District of Columbia, where Congress have a general jurisdiction, might make it constitutional, and if Congressmen can legitimate themselves into sobriety, the effect of the example might recommend the scheme to the States. As it stands, the bill is without any warrant whatever, as an exercise of power by the Federal Government.

Ten years ago Senator Sumner offered in the Senate the following resolution (See Congressional Globe of May 6, 1862,) upon which no action was taken:

"Resolved, That in the efforts now making for the restoration of the Union and the establishment of peace throughout the country, it is inexpedient that the names of the victories obtained over our fellow citizens should be placed on the regimental colors of the United States."

A NEW GUNPOWDER.—The warlike Prussians are not satisfied merely with improving their army rifles, but are also making advances in the manufacture of gunpowder. The latest report is that a novel description of gunpowder, possessing extraordinary projectile power, has been adopted by the Prussian artillery. It is composed of a certain proportion of nitre and sulphur, and in this state can be kept in store without fear of explosion. To render this composition explosive it is necessary to add a sufficient quantity of sulphuric acid to make it cohesive, and when dried it is ready for use. This composition has certainly the advantage of cheapness, combined with extreme simplicity in its manufacture, and is said to have but little residue after being fired.

FLORIDA LEGISLATURE.

The official canvass of the vote of the State, shows that the Legislature will be Republican in both branches, by a majority of one. The Senate will be composed of 12 Republicans, 11 Conservatives and 1 Liberal Republican—Liberty Bellings who is President pro tempore of the Senate, and will exercise great influence in that body. The Assembly will consist of fifty-two members, 26 Republicans, 23 Conservatives and 10 wishy-washy members whom both parties claim. Old wishy-washy was one of those independent, no party candidates who ran against the regular nominee of our party and by his popularity combined with the Republican strength was elected to a county strongly Conservative. He is of no service to our party and cannot be trusted by the other. His death or resignation before his term expires would doubtless be a blessing to both parties and save his constituents from much disappointment and displeasure, but certainly not without due retribution for their error in supporting him. The whole people will have a proportionate atonement to make for their folly.
