## FIRE IN NEW ORLEANS.

New Orleans, Jan. 4. Five stores on Magazine street, known as Aurich's row, have been burned—loss \$75,000; insurance \$50,000 in home companies.

## DEPLORABLE SUICIDE.

New Orleans, Jan. 4. L. Moulter, tobacco merchant, shot himself dead this morning in a city railroad car. The reported cause is pecuniary loss. He leaves a wife and three children.

## EXTENSIVE CHLOROFORM ROBBERY.

New Orleans, Jan. 4. D. Jones, jeweler, 279 Barroux Street, has been chloroformed and robbed of \$25,000 in jewelry and money.

## OHIO FLOODS THREATENED.

Cincinnati, Jan. 4. The rivers above emptying into the Ohio are flooding. The people here are moving their goods from the low places in anticipation of a flood.

## THE MEDOC INDIAN WAR.

San Francisco, Cal., Jan. 4. The latest advices from the Medoc war are that the Federal troops were awaiting transportation for the howitzers. Meanwhile Captain Jack's forces were increasing.

## CONSERVATIVE LEGISLATURE.

New Orleans, Jan. 4. The Conservative Legislature is expected to re-assemble on Monday. General Emory's troops still hold the Mechanics Institute.

## RAILROAD ACCIDENT.

Cleveland, O., Jan. 4. Yesterday afternoon train was thrown from the track by a broken rail, near New Castle, and two of its coaches burned. Twenty passengers were hurt, two seriously.

## A "LOUISIANA" ROW IN ARKANSAS.

Little Rock, Jan. 4. Two State governments are proposed for Arkansas, to compel Congress to take some action.

## SUICIDE OF AN EDITOR.

St. Louis, Jan. 4. F. Kupp, editor of the Bellevue Zeitung, committed suicide.

## FROM NEW YORK—WEATHER, &amp;c.

New York, Jan. 4. Weather clear and mild, the obstacles to travel disappearing. Several accidents from snow slides from roofs—a boy was killed. Many persons were in the bay all night on boats lost in the fog. The channel for the Erie had experienced its confidence in recovering there, and a half million dollars from Vanderbilt.

## HEAVY LONDON FAILURE, &amp;c.

London, Jan. 4. John F. Bawson & Co. of this city dealers in Manchester goods, have failed. Liabilities reported at fifteen million dollars. It is reported that other failures will follow.

## REPORTED IMPORTANT ACTION OF THE PRESIDENT.

Washington, Jan. 4. A private telegram from New Orleans says: "All the customhouse employees who are members of the Legislature have resigned, been removed or suspended." This is the end of the quota. The above related proceedings are anticipatory of the President's order, soon to be issued, notifying all persons holding United States Commissions that the acceptance or holding of office under any State authority is inconsistent with the scope of their official duty and an improper interference with State concerns. There is authority for saying that the President has not, (contrary to recent publication,) ever mentioned William M. Everts as Fish's successor for Secretary of State.

## FROM WASHINGTON.

Washington, Jan. 4. It is stated that George Fisher, hailing from Augusta, Ga., is a prominent applicant for the Japan mission. The President pardoned to-day from the Albany penitentiary David Rainwater and Gabriel Hamblight, convicted of larceny offences and sentenced, the former to eight, the latter to two years imprisonment.

## ANOTHER DESTRUCTIVE FIRE.

New Haven, Conn., Jan. 4. Benjamin & Ford's jewelry store has been destroyed by fire—loss \$30,000.

## ILLNESS OF EMPEROR NAPOLEON.

London, Jan. 4. The Emperor Napoleon is suffering from stone in the bladder.

LONDON. The bulletin announces the Emperor's unchanged condition, but the physicians are apprehensive of serious results.

## DISASTERS AT SEA.

HAVANA, Jan. 4. The brig *Napier* has been abandoned at sea.

The bark *A. Hunter* is ashore. The brig *Amelia Ann* has sunk. The small *pox* prevails in this neighborhood.

LONDON, Jan. 4. The *Isle of Hartley*, from New York for Antwerp, cotton laden, has been abandoned at sea. Most of her crew were saved.

## FROM CUBA.

HAVANA, Jan. 4. The *European Journal* has appeared. The Spanish troops have captured Col. Isidore Benet and Bretor Guerout.

## BRITISH PRESS ON THE SANDWICH ISLANDS.

LONDON, Jan. 4. The *Standard* this morning says, the annexation of the Sandwich Islands to the United States would be no menace to England, but to Austria, and urges as a means of restoring the equilibrium, in the event of such a transfer of territory taking place, the annexation of the Pelee Islands to Australia.

## MUTINY.

LONDON, Jan. 4. There was a slight mutiny yesterday on board the British steamer *Aurora*, now lying at Plymouth. The demonstration was soon suppressed.

## WAR SHIPS DAMAGED.

LONDON, Jan. 4. The ships *Northumberland*, *Hercules* and *Sultan*, of the channel squadron, were somewhat damaged by the recent severe gales.

## STEAMSHIP ASHORE.

BOSTON, Jan. 4. The steamship *Texas* from Liverpool, arrived here on Friday in a dense fog, and while coming up the harbor went ashore and remained there this forenoon, her bows resting on the shore and fast, while under her stern there are twenty feet of water. It is expected that after discharging a portion of her cargo she will come off without material damage. The British steamer *Sir Francis*, also from Liverpool, went ashore yesterday afternoon on Hampton beach, during a dense fog. The passengers and crew are safe.

## BANK STATEMENT.

New York, Jan. 4. The bank statement shows a gain of nearly a million of dollars in reserve. Loans increased three-quarters of a million; specie increased two and a quarter millions; legal tenders increased a trifle; deposits increased five and a quarter millions.

## DEPARTURE OF GOV. HOFFMAN.

New York, Jan. 4. Gov. Hoffman sails on Wednesday for a two years' voyage.

## THE STOKES TRIAL.

New York, Jan. 4. The argument in the Stokes case will be concluded on Monday afternoon. Great crowds were around the court of Oyer and Terminer to-day when Mr. Tremaine was making the concluding argument in the defense of Stokes. He was very severe upon the boy Hart, alleging he was perjured and his accusations upon the character of Fish were quite bitter. He claimed that the shooting of Fish by Stokes, under even an apprehension of danger, if sincere, was a justifiable defense.

## THE NEW ORLEANS MUDDLE.

New York, Jan. 4. The Post this afternoon says, dispatches from New Orleans report that the War-mountain fight have not yet abandoned the fight. Warmouth's leadership, to be sure, ended, with his official life, with the old year; but it is said that the democrats and republicans who were elected to the legislature on the liberal ticket propose on Monday to inaugurate McEnery. This has given rise to many alarming stories about the probable violence and bloodshed, which no doubt many of the bad spirits of both sides would welcome; but it is probable that no attempt at violent proceedings is contemplated. If the McEnery men meet peacefully and organize the State government, as some say they intend to do simply to make up the case for the courts, they must not be considered necessarily rebels. If the Peace-back party cannot tolerate a judicial controversy, that is a sign that they have no confidence in their own cause. An investigation ought to be had of the political affairs of Louisiana, as it is by no means clear who is right if there is any right violated.
