UPREME COURT.

THURSDAY, JAN. 10, 1873. Court met at 10 a. m. Present: Chief Justice Pearson and Justices Beade, Rodman, Boyden and Settle.

The case of J. O. Blount vs. R. C. Windly, from Beaufort, was taken up. Col. Ed. Graham Hayswood, for the applicant, maintained the argument and will resume to-day.

Afterwards, and on the 17th March, 1869, the General Assembly enacted a substitute providing that the bill of said Bank should be a legal effect to any judgment and execution which had been rendered on any debt due such Bank.

IMPORTANT CASE.

W. H. Howerton and others vs. S. M. D. Tate and others. This interesting case was heard before His Honor Judge Cloud, at chambers, on yesterday, in this city, jury trial having been waived.

The suit was a contest between what is known as the Caldwell Board of Directors represented by the plaintiffs, and the Legislative or Warren-Lewis Board represented by the defendants.

SUPERIOR COURT.

The Hicks Burglary Case.—Argument of Counsel and Charge of the Judge.—Verdict of Guilty.

FRIDAY, JAN. 10. The case of the State vs. Simpson Mordecai and Thomas Griffith, both colored, charged with burglariously entering and robbing the premises of William Hicks, of this county, was resumed this morning.

T. P. Devereux, Esq., opened the case for the defense. Mr. Devereux confined himself to the law bearing upon the case and made an able argument. The prosecution attempted to show a constructive breaking into the premises, but Mr. Devereux, after citing the authorities, insisted that the elements of such a breaking were wanting, and that therefore the prisoners could not be convicted.

Solicitor Cox followed, for the State. He dwelt upon the enormity of the offence and drew attention to the fact that the defence had virtually admitted the guilt of the prisoners and had fallen back upon the refinements of the law to secure the acquittal of the accused.

The design of the prisoners had been shown by an accomplice who testified that the robbery had been planned for several days in advance. The identity of the parties had been testified to by this accomplice, and his testimony corroborated in the recovery of some of the stolen property.

Maj. A. M. Lewis followed Gen. Cox for the State. He contended that according to law and the evidence the prisoners were guilty. The intention that because ten of the jurors were colored men the State could not convict, he regarded as a slur upon the jury, and said that any jurymen who should be led to a verdict of not guilty simply on account of the color of their skins would be a perjured villain.

At Spring term, 1872, of Beaufort Superior Court, and on the defendant's filing in court his Bank bills, acquired as aforesaid, the court, ordered satisfaction of the plaintiff's judgment to be entered up on the record, and from this decision the plaintiff appealed to the Supreme Court.

L. C. Edwards, Esq., closed the argument, for the defence. He reminded the jury that the indictment contained but two charges—that of burglary and that of larceny. He defined the nature of burglary to be the breaking and entering a dwelling house in the night time with intent to commit a felony; and he contended that if any one of these elements was wanting the charge could not be sustained.

The case was ably argued by Judge and Woodley for plaintiffs and Judge Morrison for defendants, and many interesting side points were made. The Judge decided that the plaintiff, Howerton, and his Board, appointed by the Governor, were the lawful successors, and that those made by the speakers of the respective houses of the Legislature were illegal; whereupon Judge Morrison took an appeal to the Supreme Court, which was probably come off at its present session.
