SUPERIOR COURT. WEDNESDAY, JAN. 15, 1873.

State vs. George Dowd, col., for the Murder of Turner Davis, col. This case was taken up this morning, Solicitor Cox and F. H. Busbee, Esq., for the State, M. J. A. M. Lewis for the prisoner.

The prisoner Dowd is a mulatto, 17 years old, and on the 17th of last November killed the deceased Turner Davis, his step-father, at Oberlin, a negro settlement, some two miles west of Raleigh, under the following circumstances, testified to by the witnesses.

Dr. James McKee, having professional business elsewhere, was first called, and testified that he had been called upon to make a post mortem examination of deceased. He described the wound to be a stab of a knife in the right thigh, near the groin, some one and a half inches long and deep enough to sever the femoral artery, and that death was caused by hemorrhage from that wound.

The prisoner Dowd is a mulatto, 17 years old, and on the 17th of last November killed the deceased Turner Davis, his step-father, at Oberlin, a negro settlement, some two miles west of Raleigh, under the following circumstances, testified to by the witnesses.

Cross-Examined by Mr. Lewis.

Caroline Davis, wife of the deceased, was there called for the defence. She testified that the killing took place at her house and that she was present and in bed. The first she heard was her husband starting for the door, when he turned round and said to prisoner, "George, you have been a long time talking of being a man; I'm going to hit you this morning."

Witness returned in about ten minutes and heard the rattling of chains, and heard deceased say, "Caroline, see where George has cut me;" went immediately in and saw the blood flowing down deceased's leg and through the floor.

Cross-Examined by General Cox.

Was awake at the time and looking at the prisoner and deceased as they sat by the fire. Deceased did not hold George after pulling him down. Been married to deceased about five years; the kindest feelings existed in the family.

John Jones, col., was called to testify to the good character of the prisoner. Lawrence Hinton said the prisoner was an apprentice of his in the harness-making business, and bore a very high reputation.

This closed the testimony for the defence, and the court took a recess for half an hour. At the expiration of that time F. H. Busbee, Esq. opened the argument for the State.

He told the jury that the solicitor, with whom he fully concurred, in the absence of evidence of malice would not press the charge of murder but would look to the jury for a verdict of manslaughter. The death of Turner Davis was admitted, and at the hands of the prisoner, and he insisted that the killing was manslaughter, though the prisoner might have been at the time engaged in a lawful act.

Legislature of North Carolina. SENATE. WEDNESDAY, JAN. 15th, 1873.

The Senate was called to order at 12 o'clock. Lieutenant Governor Brogden, on being seated, spoke as follows: SENATORS: The Constitution of North Carolina declares that the Lieutenant Governor shall preside as President of the Senate.

I deem it due to myself to declare on this occasion that I will make no declaration of neutrality, and I shall try to act fairly and impartially, knowing no party but what I conscientiously believe to be right, and I call rely upon your kindness and indulgence to cover my errors. My experience has taught me that it is a position for the presiding officer of a legislative body composed of course, of many different minds and opinions, to give entire satisfaction on all occasions.

The public institutions of the State should receive the careful attention of the Legislature. The asylum for the Deaf and Dumb and the Blind, the asylum for the insane, and also the Penitentiary, are all supported by the tax payers of the State, and it is the duty of the Legislature to properly investigate the management of those institutions, and to allow no injustice or oppression, no favoritism or partiality to be wrongfully practiced by any of their managers or employes.

Let us faithfully attend to the educational interests and necessities of the children of the State. Let us provide necessary and proper means for the cultivation of the mind and morals of the rising generations. Our constitution wisely provides "for a general and uniform system of public schools, where instruction shall be free of charge to all the children of the State between the ages of six and twenty-one years."
