and in others still by men who were, or fancied they were, surrounded by dangers which they felt they must adopt means and measures to protect themselves from, then I would not vote for the bill. If I did not know that at this late day no ob ject or purpose of the criminal laws of the State could be subserved by a series of prosecutions such as this bill is intended prevent, and that the punishment of those whom this bill proposes to pardon under like circumstinces and for like reasons, from committing similar offences, I would not vote for the bill. If I were not convinced by what I know of history of the times in which the offences which this bill will pardon were committed, that these who committed such offences were entitled to some show of forgiveness at our hands, and that the peace and good order of society, in a great measure depended upon the passage of the hill and that it is the true policy, of the Legstature to poss it, I would not vote for it. I place my advectey and support of this measure on fir higher grounds than the Republican Senators on this floor are willing to concede. As I said, in my remarks the other day, I have not now, and never had any connection whatever with any of the organizations mentioned in the bill, I have always and do now condemn the crimes and excesses of them all. I deplore the necessity for a measure like this, but that necessity exists, and, for one, I wish to meet and provide for it in a way which I think will be for the best interest of soiety, for the peace and prosperity of the State and all her people. My course in this matter, I trust, is not dictated by projudice or bias, but by a sincere desire accomplish something for the weal of our dear old commonwealth; I hope I shall never have occasion to look back with regret upon this hour.
