Legislature of North Carolina.

SENATE. WEDNESDAY, Jan. 29. The Senate was called to order at 11 o'clock, President Brocken in the chair.

Mr. Linn presented a memorial from citizens of Richmond county praying for the passage of a law to abate the annual gathering in that county called the "couch fair."

Mr. Powell introduced a bill to incorporate the Hax River and New Hope Transportation company.

Mr. Hamphrey, a bill to aid the people of the State in ascertaining the title to their lands.

Mr. Guider a bill to empower the committee on the affairs of the Eastern Division of the Western N. C. Railroad to investigate also the affairs of the Western Division of that road.

Mr. Walker, a bill to change the times for holding the Superior Courts of the 9th Judicial district.

Mr. Nicholson, a bill to amend title 14, sec. 2, chap. 319, Code of Civil procedure.

Mr. Dabham, a bill to amend the sales of public land in justly due order.

Mr. Scott, a bill to authorize two additional terms of the Superior Court of Granville.

Mr. Ellis, of Catawba, a bill to incorporate the Hous Ford Manufacturing Company.

Mr. Allen, a resolution for the relief of the Wilmington and Weldon Railroad Company.

Also a bill to amend the act amending the act in operating the Wrightsville Turnpike company.

A message was received from the House transmitting sundry engrossed bills and resolutions, which were referred.

Also a message transmitting the report of the joint select committee on Judge Bartle's compilation of the status, announcing the satisfactory completion of the work.
