

HOOR DISPATCHES.

THE TWEED JURY TRIAL—JURY FAIL TO AGREE. New York, Jan. 31. The Tweed jury failed to agree last evening, and were ordered to be locked up, and the court adjourned till this morning.

CUBAN AFFAIRS.

HAVANA, Jan. 31. The Year of Cuba concludes a laudatory editorial on Amadeus and his scheme of reform, including the abolition of slavery, thus: "But we believe that unfortunately, with or without reform, the submission of the rebels will have to be obtained with soldiers and arms."

LEXINGTON (Ky.) MUNICIPAL ELECTION.

LEXINGTON, Jan. 31. A company of Federal soldiers have arrived, but they did not appear. The negroes around the polls largely outnumbered the whites, but the poll-tax requirement disqualified two-thirds of them and the whites have municipal control. The Democrats have 500 majority.

KANSAS KUKLUXING.

TOPEKA, Jan. 31. Senator Pomeroy has a dangerous pneumonia. Three negro incendiaries have been hanged at Arrow Rock, Mo., by a vigilance committee.

THE LATE NORFLEET DISASTER.

LONDON, Jan. 31. A telegraphic dispatch to Lloyd's, from their Agent at Cadix, confirms the report that it was the Spanish steamer Merillo which ran into and sank the emigrant ship Norfleet, off Dungeness light house on the night of the 23rd inst. The steamship, however, was not sunk herself, as was at one time believed, but had arrived at Cadix in safety. Her destination was Lisbon, for which port she had a cargo, but upon entering that harbor she was signalled not to land as there is an extradition treaty between Portugal and Great Britain under which her officers would have been surrendered to the British authorities to answer the charges brought against them. She consequently put to sea again and proceeded for Cadix, as there is no extradition treaty between Great Britain and Spain. The Merillo sustained no damage by the collision. Her officers and crew will soon be examined at Cadix in relation to the disaster.

FROM WASHINGTON—VETO MESSAGE—THE COTTON TAX.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 31. The President sent the following veto message to the Senate to-day: To the Senate of the United States: I have the honor to return herewith Senate bill No. 490, entitled an act for the relief of the East Tennessee University without my approval. This charter for which \$15,000 are appropriated out of the moneys of the United States arises in part for the destruction of property by troops in time of war and therefore the same objections attach to it as were expressed in my message of June 1st, 1872, returning the Senate bill awarding \$25,000 to J. Milton Best, if the precedent is once established, that the government is liable for the ravages of war, the end of demands upon the public treasury cannot be forecast. The loyalty of the people of the section in which the university is located, under circumstances of personal danger and trials, thus entitling them to the most favorable construction of the obligation of the government towards them, is admitted, and nothing but regard for my duty to the whole people is opposing a principle which, if allowed, will entangle greater burdens upon the whole than the relief which will be afforded to a part by allowing this bill to become a law, could induce me to return it with objections. Recognizing the claims of these citizens to sympathy and the most favorable consideration of their claims by the government, I would heartily favor a donation of the amount appropriated by this bill, for their relief.

U. S. GRANT.

(Signed) U. S. GRANT. Executive Mansion, Jan. 29, 1878. The Committee on Ways and Means to-day discussed Mr. Beck's bill to refund the cotton tax. The vote stood: Against the bill, Messrs. Kelly, Burchard, Finkenburgh, Ellis, Roberts and Dawes. For the bill: Messrs. Maynard, Beck and Kerr. Mr. Dawes agreed with the minority that the export tax on cotton was unconstitutional, but thought that this was not the proper time to take legislative action on the subject. The committee will report adversely on the bill, with the understanding, however, that the minority shall have a full hearing before the House.

CONGRESSIONAL.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 31. House.—A conference committee has been appointed on the sleep of war bill. The bill removing A. T. Harlowe's (of Mississippi) disabilities passed. The day was consumed with private bills. SENATE.—The Senate discussed steamship subsidies without result.

BIRTH OF A SPANISH PRINCE.

MADRID, Jan. 31. There is great rejoicing over the birth of the Prince yesterday. The happy event was celebrated by singing Te Deums in all the churches, firing salutes, and a general illumination of the city of Madrid last night. The Prince is to be christened Louis Amadeo Francis.

DIRTY RADICAL DOINGS.

MONTEVIDEO, Jan. 31. The Lion Governor refused to put the motion to reconsider yesterday's vote by which Miller, radical, was seated and Edwards, democrat, displaced. Edwards was absent at the taking of the vote. (The Alabama Legislature is radical in both branches.—Ed.)

THE PORTLAND TELEGRAPH.

HARRISBURG, Pa., Jan. 31. The State Senate yesterday adopted a resolution instructing the U. S. Senators from Pennsylvania to vote against the purchase or control of the telegraphs by the government. The resolution was adopted by a vote of 25 to 1.

THE WEATHER.

PORT DEPOSIT, Md., Jan. 31. The thermometer was at twenty-two degrees below zero last night.
