FROM GEORGIA.

ATLANTA, Feb. 18.

The Legislature has taken no action on the bond compromise; it will adjourn sine die to-morrow.

The Pullman Palace Cars commence running to-day from Lynchburg to New Orleans without change by the Kennebec route via Mobile, Montgomery, Atlanta, and thence by the Western and Atlantic road to Dalton, Lynchburg and Washington.

FROM WASHINGTON.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 18.

The Senate committee on privileges and elections are all present—assembled at 41 o'clock, and now at one o'clock are still in session. Members who came out for necessity purposes refused to answer questions. Congress unimportant.

HEAVY RAINS.

RICHMOND, Feb. 19.

Heavy rains are reported from all sections of the State during the past two days, and heavy landslides on several railroads causing detention of trains. The river at Lynchburg is about 14 feet above the usual level. At this point it is about 10 feet, which will be greatly increased by the flood from above.

FROM NEW JERSEY.

The railroad bill in the interest of the Pennsylvania railroad passed the Senate—vote 11 to 9.

FROM WASHINGTON.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 18.

Boutwell has not resigned.

Hon. F. W. Sykes, of Ala., will this week present his credentials to the Senate as Senator from Alabama for the term commencing on the 4th of March, accompanied by a memorial setting forth the grounds of his claim. He is attended by his counsel, R. A. O'Neal and Gen. John T. Morgan. Mr. Sykes was elected by what is known as the Capitol Legislature. The points to be presented involve the legality of both the bodies claiming to be the legislature of the State.

After Thursday next, it will be impossible to get any bill through the House which cannot command a two-thirds majority, because till the end of the session motions to suspend the rules are in order and can be made against any pending matter, and the time can be consumed in calling the year and may be motions. This may be important as applying in any legislation that may be attempted for Louisiana or any other matter that has not a clear two-thirds majority in its favor.

REPORT ON THE CREDIT MOBILIERS.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 18.

In the House to-day, Mr. Poland, of Vt., chairman of the Credit Mobilier committee, made a long report, reciting in detail all the facts in evidence as against each one of the members implicated.

The speaker (Blaine) was entirely exonerated from all connection with the matter, he having declined to take any of the Credit Mobilier stock.

In regard to Davis, Garfield, Kelley, Bingham and Schuyler, the facts in each case are stated with more or less severity in their action, and commanding to the consideration of members, appraised under like circumstances, the letter of the venerable Senator Bayard, of Delaware, desiring to take a pecuniary interest in any matter that might come before him as a legislator.

In regard to Ames and Brooks, their conduct is severely reprobated, and resolution of censure in reference to each of them is reported to the House.

The report having been read further action on it was postponed till Tuesday next.

In regard to the Senators involved, the report states that the evidence implicating them has been sent to the Senate for its action.

FROM SPAIN.

MADRID, Feb. 18.

The official Gazette of Thursday next will contain an official proclamation offering amnesty to the Carlists now in insurrection in the northern provinces if they will, within two weeks, lay down their arms and submit to the authority of the government. If the insurgents refuse to accept this offer, they will be publicly proscribed, and decisive measures will be adopted by the government for the suppression of the insurrection.

The question of sending representatives to the South American Republics is under consideration by the government.

THE LOUISIANA TROUBLES.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 18.

The majority of the committee on privileges and elections will, it is understood, report in favor of a new election in Louisiana. There will be two minority reports—one sustaining McEary as Governor of that State, and admitting McMillan as Senator, the other sustaining Kellogg as Governor, and admitting Ray to the Senate. This is the present condition of the commission, although they may, before making their report unanimously recommend a new election in Louisiana.

CONGRESSIONAL.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 18.

Mr. Sawyer, from the Committee on Education and Labor, reported with amendments to Mr. Lewis' bill for the promotion of education in the Southern States.

As amended, the bill provides for distributing two million dollars to Delaware, Maryland, Virginia, West Virginia, North Carolina, South Carolina, Georgia, Florida, Alabama, Mississippi, Louisiana, Texas, Arkansas, Missouri, Kentucky, Tennessee, and the District of Columbia, in the ratio of the population, for the education of children from six to sixteen years of age, irrespective of color or condition.

The House bill declaring that the exemption allowed by the bankrupt law shall be the amount allowed by the constitution and laws of each State in 1871, and that such exemptions be valid against debts contracted before the adoption of such State constitutions as well as those contracted afterwards, and against liens by judgment or decree of any State court, was taken up and passed.

The House bill giving the reports of the debates to Murtagh, of the *Republican*, failed—44 to 72. This continues the printing with the *Globe*.

The House went into committee of the whole on the Credit Mobilier report. It covers six columns.
