Crenshaw, of Louisburg, who has been quarantined in Harris' Township, attending to the small pox cases there, since the 12th of December, has been permitted to return to his family, and gives an interesting sketch of the origin, progress and extirpation of the disease in that town-He says he has spent his days and nights with the sifflicted people; has treated 28 cases in all ; of these 10 died, from the prevalence of bad weather, want of skilled nurses, proper nourishment and the virulency of the disease. The fatal cases, he says were perfectly overwhelming, partaking of deep congestion, and that the disease could not be brought out. and others of there cases were confluent and typhoid. The special order to amend and carry out the act to construct Marion and Mo Dowell Turnpike, being the special order,
