JUDGE SHERMAN.

This distinguished gentleman is a brother of General Sherman and a Judge of the Federal Court in Ohio. He presented to a Board of Bankers a bill of \$10,000 for services in the lobby of Congress upon the bill to repeal the tax on borrowed capital.

"I want to work, and had an interview with Mr. Boutwell and John Sherman, Chairman of the Senate Finance Committee, with Mr. Garfield, and other prominent members of Congress, and the result was that it became the policy of the Administration to repeal not only the tax in question, but the stamp and other taxes."

"I want, with perfect confidence in its truth, that I never spoke a word or wrote a letter or an argument, or caused one to be written, to Senator Sherman or Gen. Garfield on that matter, or any other that had or might come before them in their legislative capacity."

"The proposed action of the Government in relation to the stockholders of the Credit Bank, of whom your father was one, may result in a severe blow to you."

REMARKS OF SENATOR AVERA.

Pending the consideration of Senator Norwood's bill providing for the appointment of two Commissioners of Agriculture at a salary of \$1,300 each, and pending an amendment offered by Senator Merrimon...

Mr. Avera said: Mr. President:—I rise with great reluctance to oppose any measure proposed by the venerable and distinguished Senator from Orange, Mr. Norwood, and I would not consume one moment of the time of the Senate now, did I not feel it my duty to do so.

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The Tribune suggests that Gen. Sherman, without waiting for Congressional action, should take steps to remove his brother Charles from the Judiciary. The question now arises, where is the pardoning power? We have already seen that the only pardoning power after conviction is vested in the Governor and the organic law or constitution prohibits him from the use of that power in case of impeachment.

That pardoning power cannot be in the Legislature for the Legislature is subject to the constitution, and the constitution nowhere gives the pardoning power after conviction to the Legislature; and hence the Legislature has no constitutional power to remove after conviction from any State officer the disqualification to hold office imposed by the constitution upon conviction of misdemeanor in office.

The pardoning power rest in the case of impeachment! The answer is found in article 1, section 37 of the constitution. The question still is: where does the pardoning power rest in the case of impeachment? The answer is in these words: "This enumeration of rights shall not be construed to impair or deny others retained by the people; and all powers not herein delegated remain with the people."
