If still further to the north I see the great New York Cen tral, that represents hundreds of million of dollars. These three roads represent thousands of millions of consolidated capital. Now suppose, in any emergency the railroad interest demands—suppose there were some great national question which demanded that the President or the United States should be a man, and the Scente should be composed of men playing into the hands of the great na tional railroads' consolidated capitals what power is there on the continent that could for a mountait resist them! INTOX: CATING LIQUORS IN GER-TAIN LOCALITIES.

Section 1. The General Assembly of North Carolina do emact.
