His Holiness the Pope has received a deputation of Belgian Catholics, who presented a large offering of Peter's pence, which the Pope graciously accepted, and after giving them his blessing retired.

The San Diego, Cal., foundry, the first established there, recently began work. The melting capacity of the furnace is 8,000 pounds, and the fuel used is Pennsylvania coal, costing there \$25 gold per ton.

The Chicago Journal says that the first thing it did when receiving a new paper is to look for its short paragraphs. And the next thing it does is to steal every one of them, says the Detroit Free Press.

It is said that the present winter is one of the mildest ever known upon the continent of Europe. In France, especially in the environs of Paris and in the gardens of the city, the trees are covered with leaves.

The supply of Cotton is insufficient in New York city, according to the daily press. Much more is wanted than is now being consumed, and more are demanded to be placed upon all our looms, large and small, than usually.

The census documents which were recently stolen from the federal palace at Bern have been recovered by the police of Frankfurt from a lottery agent, who had purchased them from the thief, and they are now on their way back to Bern.

A novel race lately took place at Bath, England. Two men wagered \$25 a side on the following contest: One competitor to be rolled down a steep hill, a distance of eighty feet, while the other ran three-quarters of a mile. The pedestrian was defeated by two minutes.

A French journal announces the formation in Paris of an association of "Friends of Order," which has already extended into three departments, with the object of protecting property and person against incendiarism, pillage, or riot. The members of the association are bound to resist attack and defend each other.

Telegraphic rates are far cheaper in the Old World than in us, yet the unthankful Europeans are not satisfied with the privileges which they enjoy in this respect. The Edinburgh Chamber of Commerce has just memorialized the Postmaster General to reduce the existing tariff to the rate of sixpence (twelve cents) for twenty word messages throughout the United Kingdom.

An immense hotel, to be erected at Bardonia, in Italy, will be the largest hotel in the world. The project has just been first proposed, and will be thirty-two feet deep, with a wing on the west end one hundred and sixty feet long. The kitchen will be a hundred and twenty feet long and the dining room two hundred and ten feet long. The main halls are to be twenty-six feet wide, and the ceilings twenty feet high. The reception and reading rooms, parlors, etc., are to be in an equally extensive scale. The hotel will be half a mile eighteen rods and two feet in length.
