It is said, by outsiders, it will require forty-five thousand dollars of this amount to feed and clothe the prisoners, pay the salaries of officers thousand to carry on the building operations. And, therefore, it seems the building operations for the next nine months

It is thought the eight million brick the Legislature expected to be made in the prison yard would not be turned out onvict at the penitentiary with a "Jack" in three years' time, for want of space sufficient in which to manufacture them.

It cost the late contractors \$14,000 to open the quarry in the present prison yard before they got any return of consequence from it.

The late contractors have received their

\$35,000 in cash for resigning their contheir tools, steam engines and derricks. The lease of the quarry on the east side of town, turned over to the new board, by the late contractors, has about two years and a half to run. nstead of reducing the number of classes to six, they are increased to nine, the number of teachers remaining the same. This statement is made in justice to my-self and co laborers, and not for the purpose of a political discussion over the
