NEWS AND OTHER ITEMS.

A La Crosse husband was recently closely confined and nearly starved to death by his wife.

Baltimore has abolished its organ-grinders who used to set its grinding organs on edge.

The separation of hartsborn from the refuse of the St. Louis gas works is said to be money-making business.

The 1st of April has been very appropriately selected by the New England Milleries as the date of the world's ending.

The New Foundlanders kill phocals babies by knocking them on the nose; sticking to their business with sealing-whacks, so to speak.

The town of Morris, in Illinois, offers a subsidy of \$20,000 to any one who will start a factory there to make anything whatsoever on a large scale.

The christian young men of Port Wayne, Ind., are vain enough to think literature their forte, and have started a paper under the title of the *Vindicator*.

A four years' contract to furnish all 100,000,000 postal cards per annum for \$1,375,000 per thousand has been awarded the Morgan Envelope Company of Springfield, Mass.

The inhabitants of Key West, Fla., decline to pay salaries to clergymen, fearing that anything suggestive of "pulpit" may injure the reputation of the place as a resort for invalids.

Two female school teachers in San Francisco, being convicted before the commissioners of using profane expletives, plead that their avocation is (s)wearing to the highest degree.

The marble cutters at work in the burned district, at Boston, struck on Monday for an increase of pay. They demand \$21 per week instead of \$17 as heretofore.

Eighteen inspectors, the Warehouse Superintendent, and a number of minor officials have been removed from the Philadelphia Customhouse, showing landable activity in the clearing out department.

FRANK M. KEY.—The Secretary of the Navy has directed the distribution of nearly \$300,000 to the officers and crew of the *Queen of the West*, [one of Eliot's fleet on the Mississippi river during the first stages of the war] for the destruction of the A. W. Baker, More and Berwick Bay.

City of Mexico telegrams state that General Porfirio Diaz has been elected Chief Justice of the Supreme Court of Mexico. He becomes president of the republic in case a vacancy occurs.

BRIDGES WITH A VENGEANCE.—An investigation into the condition of the Tomb and Blackwell's Island by the New York Tribune shows that criminal justice in New York is administered in a most reckless manner. Prison discipline and management on Blackwell's Island are wanting in influence calculated to inspire any encouragement for reform in the inmates. Police justices are constantly committing faults, while it is a common thing at the Tombs to have cases disposed of at the rate of one a minute.

DEBUNKERS AND LIFE INSURANCE.—DEBUNKERS' LIES.—The case of Elizabeth Gerleman, administratrix of Christian Gerleman, deceased, against the Knickerbocker Life Insurance Company, which has been on trial for several days in the Superior Court, was concluded yesterday by a judgment of non pros. This was an action to recover \$2,000 on a life insurance policy issued to Christian Gerleman, the deceased husband of plaintiff.

Judge Devin, in passing upon the prayer which had been offered on both sides, said, in substance, that he availed himself of the present opportunity to repeat, as he had several times ruled before, that the contracts of insurance companies were to be construed in the same spirit as other contracts. That to construe the notice that the rules should be administered differently for them and for other citizens would be disastrous and unjust.

He then alluded to the enormous amount of money involved in life insurance policies in the United States; that in 1871 they were over a million in number, and that 7,000 claims were in settlement every year. He also stated that it would aggregate more than the amount of the national debt, and that there would be little security for the policy interest in the companies unless the companies were to be fairly protected by the courts under their contracts. He held that there could be no reason why a medium which awarded the policy in the event that the insured died of diphtheria, remitted should not be lawful, and that it was consistent with public policy, and as the proof showed that diphtheria died of diphtheria, the policy was void.

With regard to the prayer, that the court should be paid, alleged to have been made by a clerk in the office of the Baltimore agent, there was no evidence to support that the clerk had authority to make contributions to the company in pay a lawyer which it is not his duty to do.
